T. Lester Johnson, seeking election to the district attorneyship, has no competition. Neither has Ross Ornduff county clerk, David Reid county commissioner, E. M. Alley for coroner nor W D Wallan for justice of the peace for Moro and surrounding precincts.

County contests are but two. George Fox, Rufus stockman, is the Republican nominee for assessor.

He has served as deputy under Mrs Peetz and has covered the county in that capacity. Charles Ruggles is the Democrat. He was formerly deputy sheriff and was named assessor on the death of Mrs Peetz.

Percy Thompson is the Republican nominee for Sheriff. He is a native son, who was long secretary of the draft board where he made friends of those he contacted. He

is opposing incumbent C. C. Wilson, who has served two terms as sheriff.

Moro and Grass Valley are holding city elections. Nine measures are on the ballot and they have been discussed in these columns previously. There is no contest for the judicial nominees which means that supreme court justices, J. O. Bailey, Arthur D. Hay and Hall S Lusk will be re-elected and that D. N. Mackay of Condon will be elected circuit judge of this

district. Wily Knighten will be defeated having no competition on the elected county school superintendent non partisan ballot.

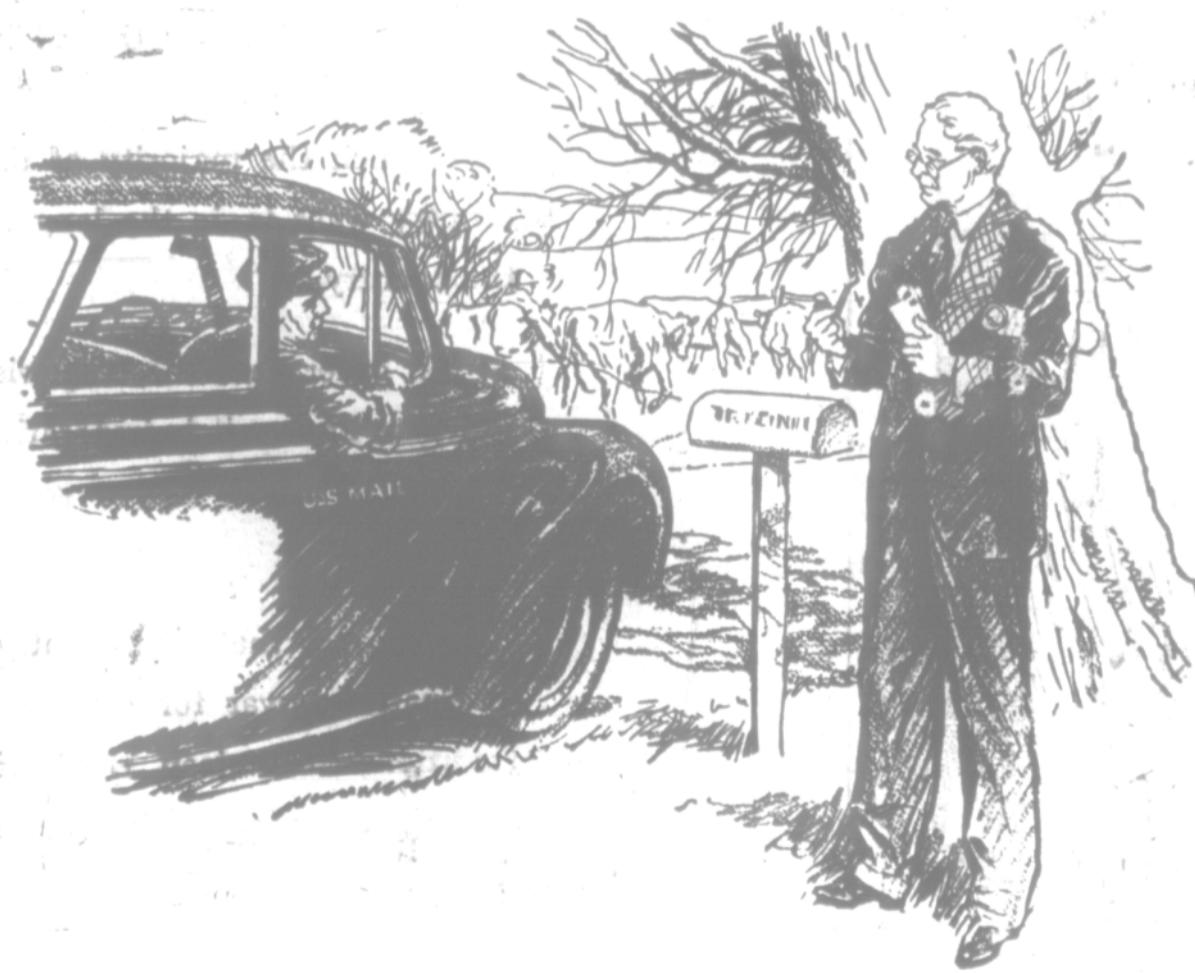
