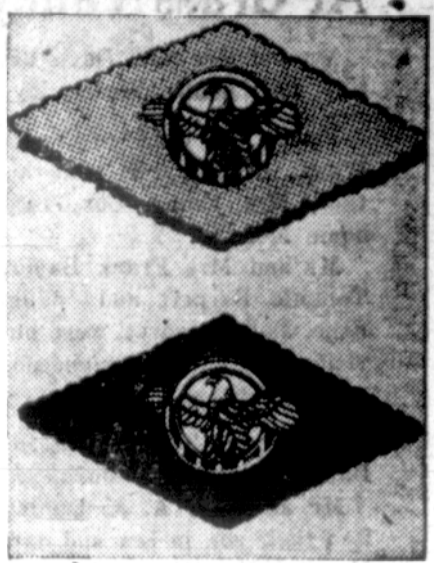
Judge D. N. Mackay was over Wednesday on business for this court of his judicial district. He reported snow in Condon that morning.
