CROP INSURANCE, MISSED

Federal crop insurance on spring wheat will be effective in three Oregon counties, though six other spring wheat counties did not reach the minimum of 50-farm participation required by law, the state AAA committee has reported.

In Umatilla, Baker and Walla counties farmers signed applications protecting spring wheat crops on 170 farms against all unavoidable hazards. Umatilla is first with 67 farm insured.

AAA committeemen point out that more spring wheat insurance undoubtedly would have been written if time had permitted. In most of the nine eligible counties, the insurance was not offered until a week before the closing date for spring wheat sign-up.

Winter wheat producers will have ample opportunity to obtain insurance on 1946 wheat crops seeded this fall, as it is expected that yield and rate information will be completed for all winter wheat counties several months before seeding time.

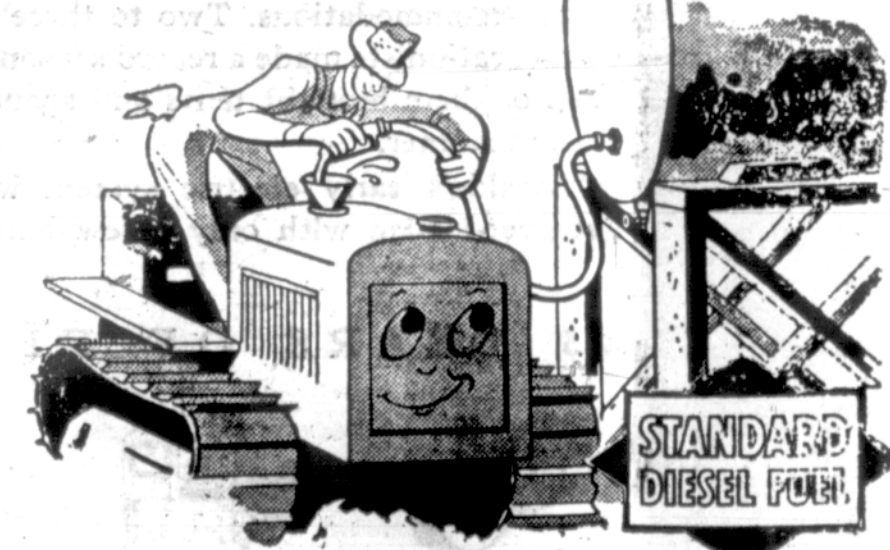

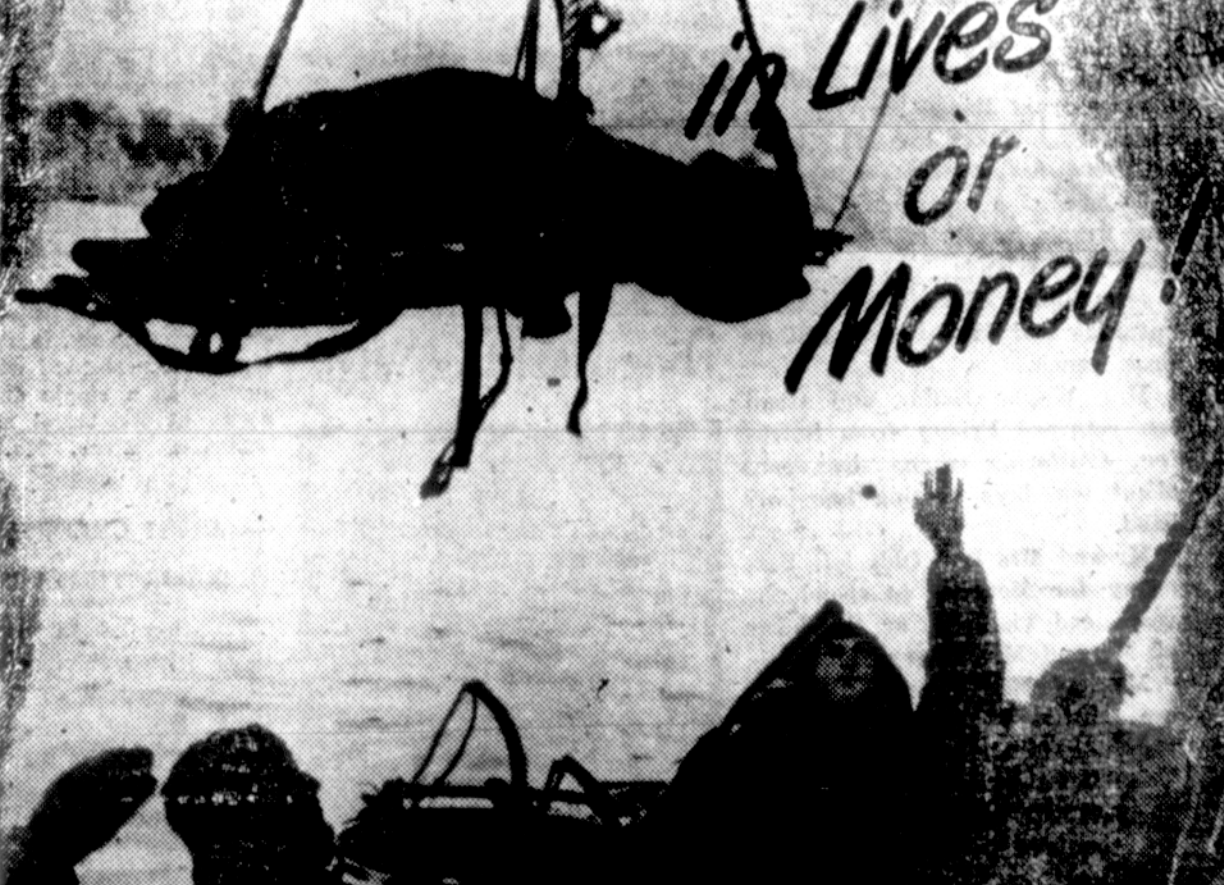
