List of Moro Teachers Completed

Superintendent E. R. Joe Barker of the Moro Public schools has completed the filling of the vacancies in the school system for the coming year.

The teaching staff will consist of four elementary teachers with the high school staff consisting of five full time teachers and one part time.

For the first time in the history of the school, Moro is going to have a fulltime music teacher and the plan at the present is to present a well rounded program for the coming year which will consist of general music in the grades, a beginners band, advanced band and both boys' and girls' chorus.

Teachers remaining from last year will be Mrs Letson, who will handle shop and mathematics. Mrs Roberson will be in the high school where she will handle English and social science.

New teachers coming into the system are E. R. Joe Barker, Superintendent and coach, a graduate from the University of Idaho in 1934 with a BS Education degree and a Masters degree completed in 1940. He has been teaching for eleven years in the states of Idaho and Washington. He is not exactly a newcomer to Moro as his athletic teams from Goldendale, Wn., have completed against Moro for the past two years.

Melt down when your oven's going, add the liquid fat to the salvage can. Take the can to your butcher as soon as it's full. He will give you four cents and two red points for every pound.
