As many as attempts to frighten the administration. President Roosevelt stated that he was "babbling along" the Japanese in an effort to appease them. Now congress is proposing a thorough investigation into the reasons why and who was responsible for selling thousands of tons to the Japanese.

To cover the situation more completely, it is suggested that the decade before Pearl Harbor be subjected to scrutiny. In the event congress authorizes the probe most of the witnesses will be residents of Washington and Oregon. The committee, if appointed, will probably hold its hearings in the Pacific northwest rather than in the District of Columbia to accommodate the people who must know most about the deals with the Japanese.

Office of war information uses ten Italian prisoners of war in its

New York office. They are brought to the headquarters in a truck, set as transistors and script writers during the day, and are then returned to Governor's island. They wear uniforms with a green arm band, showing that they are prisoners of war. They receive no pay for their services.

BONUS BONDS DUE

Bonus bonds were due June 16 of this year and no further interest will accrue on them, says Hal White, postmaster at Wasco. These are the bonds given soldiers of World War I, in 1935. They were ten year bonds and could be used for collateral. Many borrowed on them, but those who kept their bonds can now obtain the money by having their postmaster send them in to Portland.

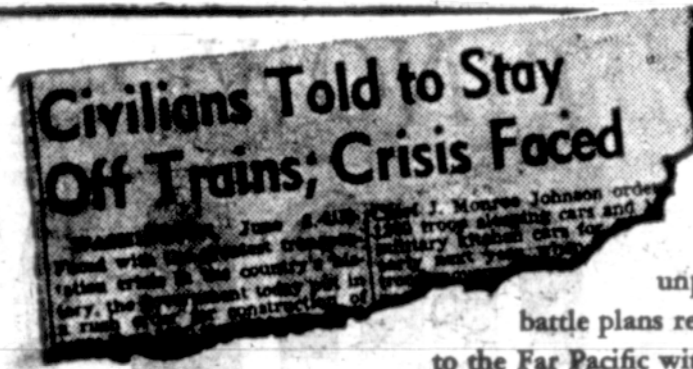
