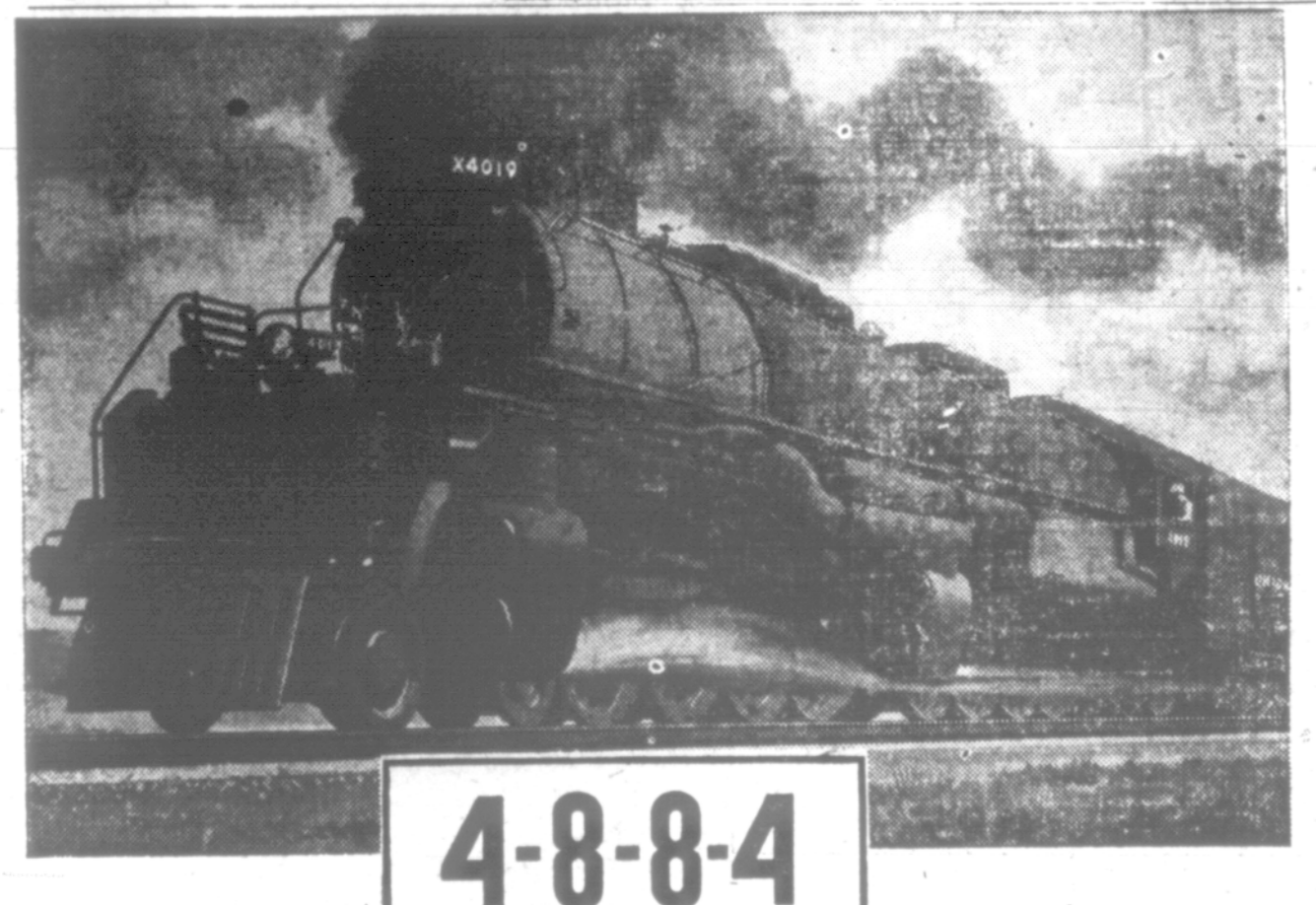

4-8-8-4

Railroaders identify various types of locomotives by the number and arrangement of wheels from front to rear. The Union Pacific locomotive pictured above is known as a "4-8-8-4"... two pairs of small wheels in front, then four pairs of driving wheels followed by a similar unit, and two pairs of smaller wheels in the rear—not including the tender.
