The condition of Afton McIntyre has not been much improved and he is still in a dangerous condition although recovery is expected.

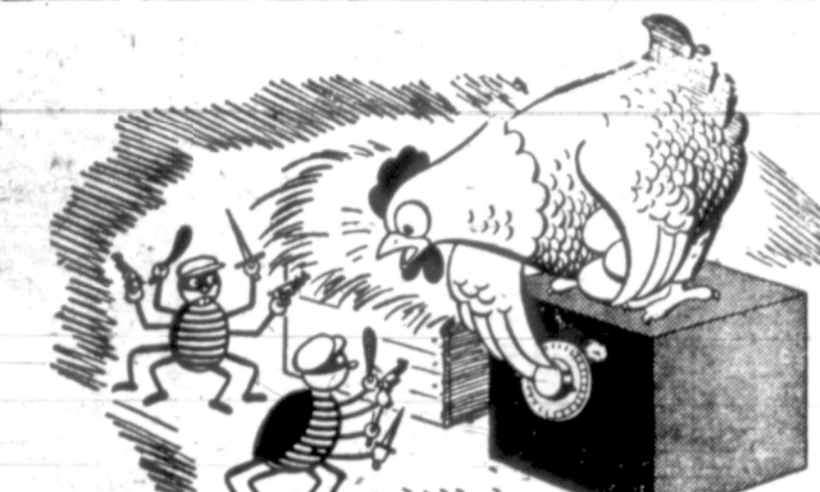

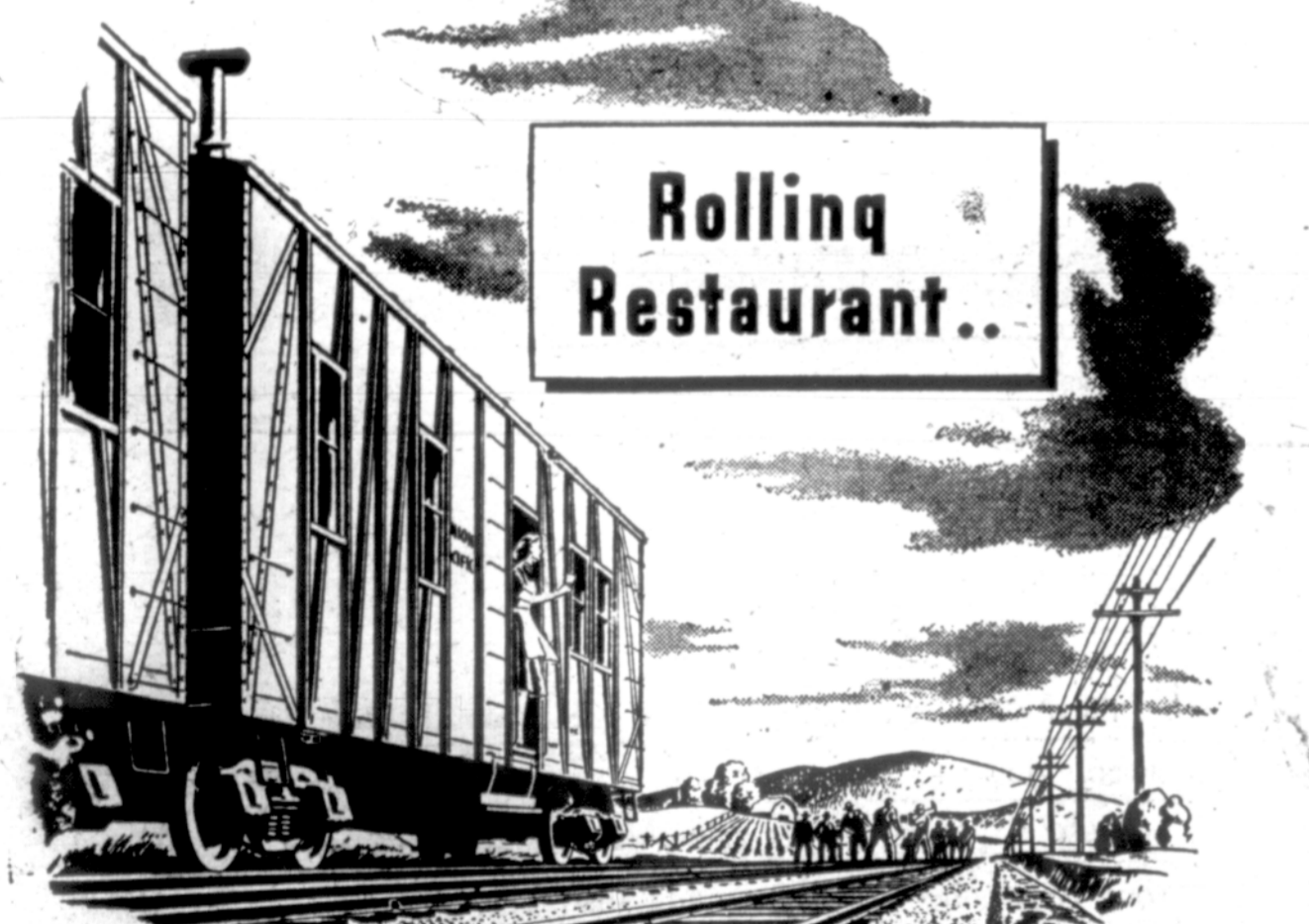
