More Machinery Made To Aid Farmers

With increased amounts of farm machinery equipment and supplies in prospect this winter and next spring, Oregon farmers should find that production is easier in 1946, according to R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee.

All important items of farm supplies and equipment for which priority ratings formerly were required now may be purchased without restriction, although supplies of scarce items will not meet all demands for some time. WPB orders, which controlled production and distribution have been revoked.

Taylor cited copper wire, gas engines, electric motors, canvas, fencing, crawler tractors and plumbing and heating supplies among items for which priorities are no longer required. Controls also have been lifted on lumber and plywood, but supplies are expected to be tight for some time. Truck rationing ends December 1.

Marked improvement in the farm machinery and repair parts situation can be expected by early 1946, the chairman reported. Order L-257-c, which required manufacturing schedules to be cleared with WPB, has been revoked, and there are no further controls on farm machinery.
