SHOE REPAIR COSTS RISE

Shoe repair shops are permitted to charge five to 15 cents a pair over their regular prices for the soling of shoes when they use

two types of soling materials now coming on the market, OPA says. The additional charges, effective September 10, 1945, are to compensate the repair shops for the higher cost of these materials, which are neolite and brown composition, rubber or fiber. Neolite is an entirely new material, while brown composition, rubber or fiber soles are similar to brown soles of these types sold before the war, except that synthetic rubber is now used in place of natural rubber. During the war repair shops used either leather or black composition, rubber or fiber, soles.

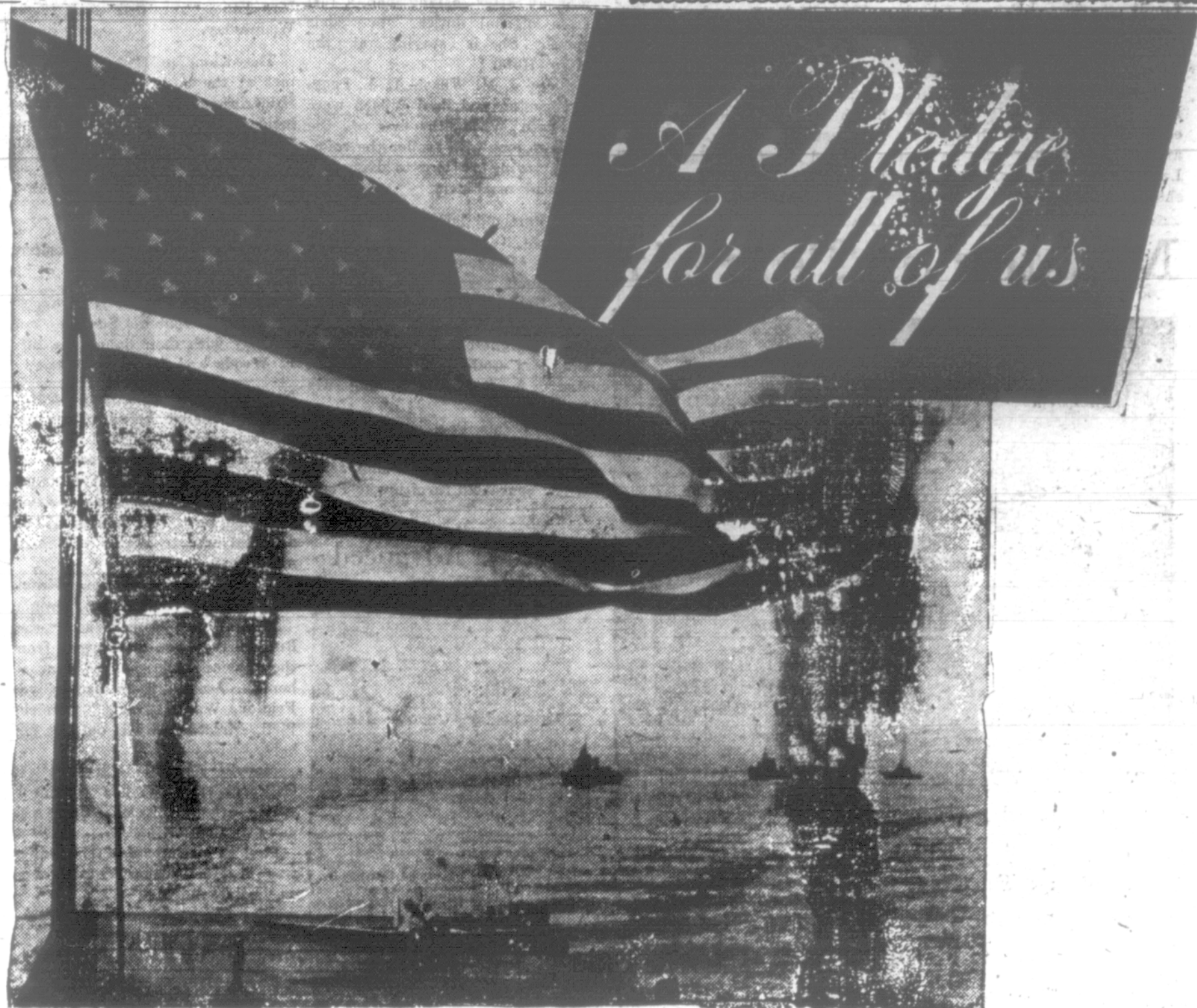
