Palestine and the late president said he learned more in a five-minute talk than he could from any other source. Congress is agitating the matter of having the British admit 100,000 Jews into Palestine, and this has been requested by President Truman.

Most Wool

Now Imported

Figures show a large proportion of the wool used by manufacturers the first seven months of this year was imported.

Prices for United States wool have been supported at a level about 20 percent higher than the current duty-paid prices of imported wools of comparable quality.

The average farm price of wool in the whole country at mid-October was 41.1 cents per pound, about 70 percent above 1935-39.

The farm price of wool in Oregon at 39 cents average at mid-October stood about 67 percent above 1935-39.

This increase in the general level of farm prices is largely offset by higher farm operation and living costs. Data show that operation expenses for Oregon's farms reached nearly 157 million dollars in 1944.

Hired farm labor was the largest item of expense in 1944, accounting for 31.4 percent. Second was commercial feedstuffs at 20.3 percent.

Operating motor vehicles accounted for 7.5 percent of the farm expense, taxes on farm real estate 3.2, livestock, chicks, etc., purchased 2.8, interest on farm mortgages 2.5 and lime, fertilizer, etc., 1.3 percent.

HOT LUNCHES POPULAR

Hot plate lunches are now being served in several hundred Oregon grade schools as federal aid and other factors have served to increase interest, reports Miss Lucy A. Case, extension nutritionist at OSC.

A four-point pattern for a good plate lunch suggested by Miss Case is a cup of whole milk in some form, a generous serving of vegetables, fruit or both; a serving of food rich in protein such as eggs, cheese, fish, meat, dried beans or peas or peanut butter, and a serving of whole grain or enriched bread or cereal.

A circular, HE 1890, giving school lunch menus and recipes is available from any extension office.

The 1945 agricultural conservation program year ends December 31, 1945, and practices on Oregon farms and ranches performed under the program must be completed before that date to be eligible for payment, according to a reminder from the state AAA committee.
