## Union Pacific Pays \$29,000 Tax Bill

The Union Pacific Railroad company's check for \$29,164.81 was handed to Sheriff C. C. Wilson by the company's agent, B. H. Robertson, Thursday, November 15th, in full payment of the railroad's net 1945 tax in Sherman county.

Over a million dollars in tax assessments throughout Oregon was met by the Union Pacific on the same date, the exact figure being \$1,028,064.30. Of this amount approximately 50 percent goes toward the support of schools and general educational purposes.

In Sherman county the Union

Pacific, as one of the counties largest taxpayers, pays between 15 and 19 percent of the total tax levied on property in the county.

Accident reports indicating mechanical defects as causative factors today led Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell to issue a reminder to Oregon motorists that thoughtful driving is important to vehicle conservation through accident prevention.

## Wheat League To Get Speakers

Two of the top agricultural leaders from Washington, D. C. have accepted invitations to speak at the eighteenth annual meeting of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League in Pendleton December 5 to 7, announces C. W. Smith, secretary of the league and members of the OSC Extension service staff.

These two men are N. E. Dodd, director of the field services division of the Production and Marketing Administration, and C. C. Farrington, head of the grain division of the PMA. Both are well known to Oregon grain growers for their past connection with the AAA organization.

Dodd, a Baker county farmer served as chairman of the Oregon state AAA committee, then was western regional director and finally national administrator when the AAA was taken into the new PMA. Farrington was also active in the national AAA organization.

The future of the American wheat industry, its relation to world wheat trade and possible postwar wheat programs of the federal government are among the top items on the program at this year's meeting, says Smith.
