TRAFFIC LOSSES GREATER THAN WAR LOSSES

A comparison of the losses of life and injuries suffered in the war and in traffic accidents at home during the period from December 7, 1941 until August 14, 1945 is startling in that it shows the seriousness of traffic dangers. Killed in the war were 261,608

soldiers, sailors and marines, wounded were 651,911, missing and prisoners bring the total up to 1,070,524.

In traffic alone 94,000 were killed and 8,300,000 injured. Total home front fatalities were 355,000 and injuries were 36,900,000 of which over a million were permanently injured.

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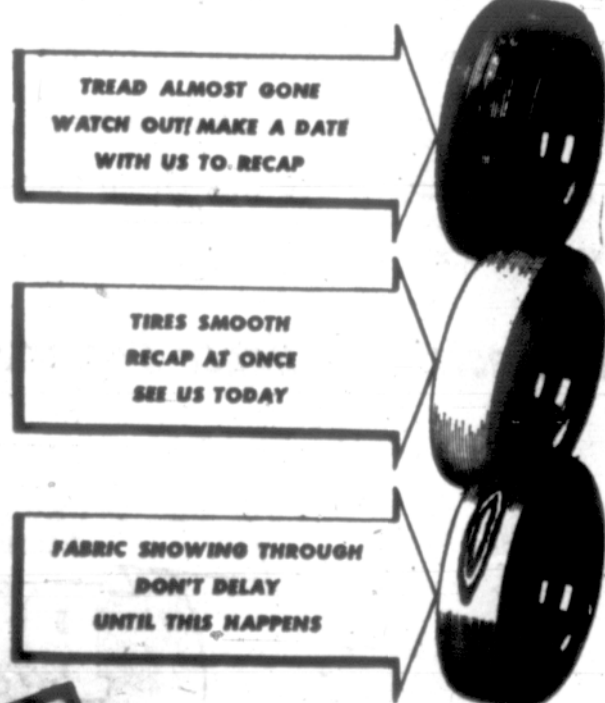
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
