MORE PENSIONS PAID

Eight hundred fifty eight monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits were in force at the end of 1945 in the area served by the La Grande office of the Social Security Board, an increase

of 220 or 55.4 percent over the number in force on December 31, 1944. Vernon A. Welo, manager, said today in a statement of the activities of the office during the year.

Approximately \$188,490.72 in monthly benefits was awarded during the year to men, women and children of this area, Mr Welo said, an increase of about \$74,666.88 over that paid out in 1944.

The C. I. O. - United Steel Workers Union said that its strike

does not not violate its contracts with steel companies.

Here is the 'No Strike' clause taken from a typed contract.

The words speak for themselves

"during the term of this agreement, neither the union nor any employee, individually or collectively, shall cause or take part in any strike or other interruption or any impeding of production at any plant of the company covered by this agreement. Any employee or employees who violate the provisions of this section may be discharged from the employ of the company in accordance with the procedure of section 8 of this agreement"

"this provision or one similar to it, is contained in each contract between the union and the various steel companies.

These contracts continue by their terms until the autumn of this year.---"
