TRAFFIC TOLL CLIMBING STEADILY

Traffic accidents claimed a toll of 15 lives during the first ten days of March, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr., said today in warning Oregon drivers and pedestrians that unsafe traffic practices were contributing a heavy toll of death and injury this year.

"Final figures on fatalities for the month of February show 35 persons killed, an all-time high for that month in Oregon's his-

tory," Farrell decried. "Such unsafe practices as passing in the face of approaching traffic, speed too great for safety on curves and drinking contributed to this tragic record."

The secretary of state said that while vehicle defects played a part in the accident upswing so far this year, the greater propor-
