Wendell Balsiger was in Portland the first of the week returning Wednesday morning.

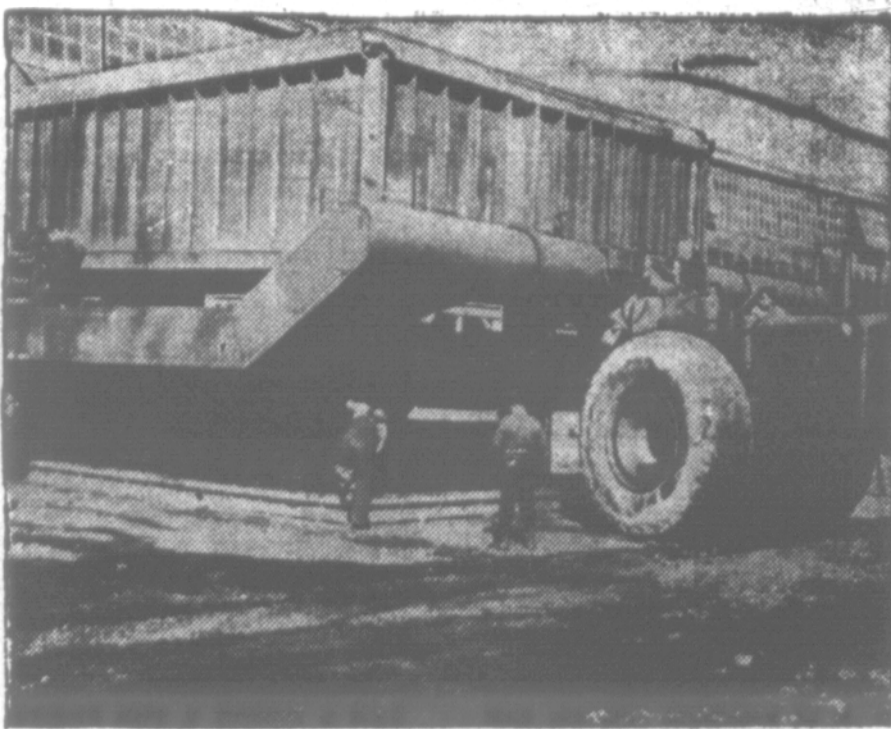
W. S. Powell was in Prineville last week end to visit with friends for a day or two.

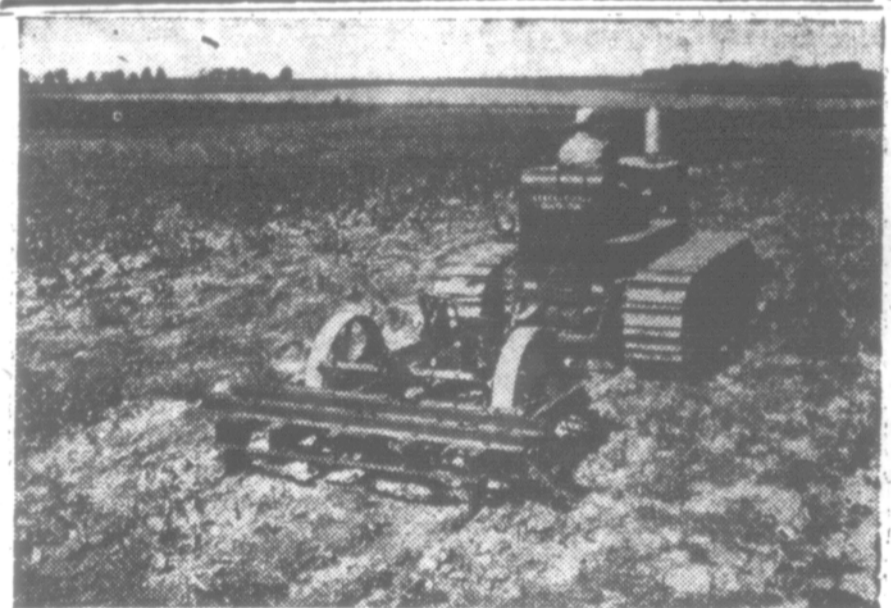
