The 1946 irrigation water outlook continues to look "very good" throughout the state of Oregon, even though the additional mountain snow during February was somewhat below normal. This is revealed in the March issue of the snow survey and water outlook report just released by the Medford office of the Soil Conservation service in cooperation with OSC experiment station.

At the beginning of March the water content of snow above the 5000 foot level averaged 72 percent greater than at this time a year ago and was 42 percent above normal for that date. Below 5000 feet the water content was 352 percent more than last year and 78 percent above normal for the years of record.

Watershed soils are generally well soaked and unfrozen, favoring sustained runoff through the season, leading to a prediction that, barring late unforeseen developments, the irrigation water supply should be adequate this year in practically all sections, and nearly equal to the record supplies of 1943.

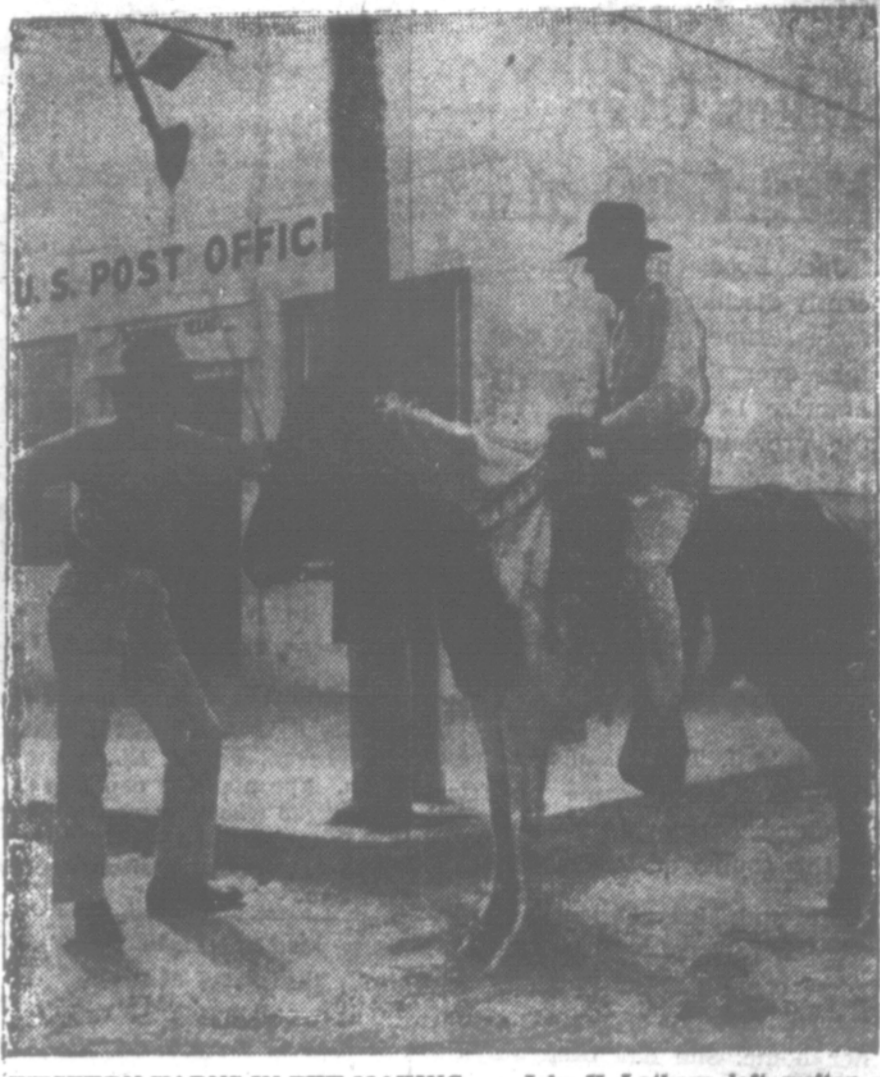
A final report on snow conditions and stream flow prospects in all principal irrigation regions of the state will be made as usual during the first week in April when the annual forecast meetings will be held.
