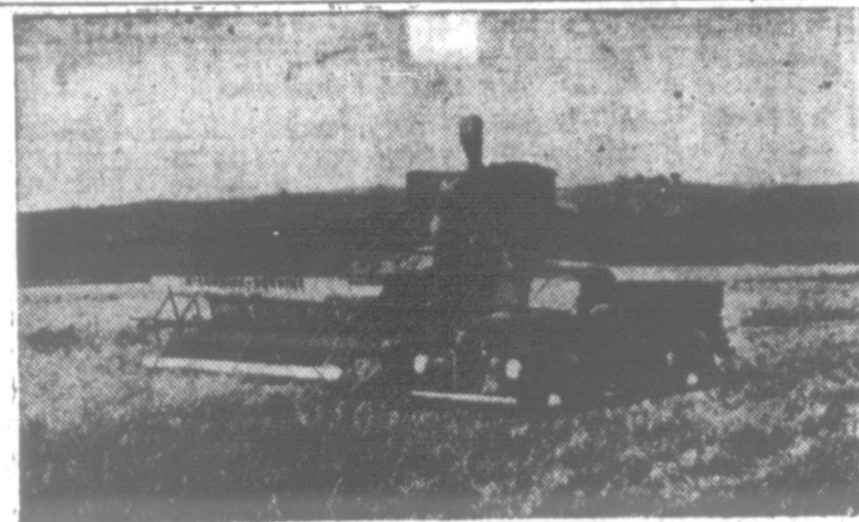

## PLAN OF HOSPITAL CARE

This Nationwide Non-Profit Hospital Program—sponsored by the American Hospital Association and your community hospitals, with over 21 million members, is now open for community enrollment to Sherman County residents from April 22nd to 27th.

Mass meetings open to all residents of Sherman County will be held Monday evening, April 22nd at 7:30 p.m. at Wasco, Moro and Grass Valley school houses. Everyone is invited and your attendance is appreciated.

Enrollment headquarters for Sherman County residents will be at the school house in Wasco, M. Grass Valley, Kent and Rufus respectively.

### What Benefits Are Included?

A Blue Cross membership pays the listed costs when you are a patient in any participating hospital. The care includes:

Hospital Benefits for a total of 111 days in each certificate year: 21 days full benefits, plus an additional 90 days at 50% benefits for men, women and children.

Bed and board and general nursing service in ward. (Member may have private or semi-private accommodation by paying the difference in cost).

All Operating, Delivery Room Service.

Anesthesia administered by hospital employee.

Dressings and Plaster Casts.

Drugs furnished by hospital.

Laboratory Examinations.

X-Ray Service.

Basal Metabolism tests

Direct enrollment costs are paid semi-annually. The semi-annual charge for one person is \$6.00, for two persons (subscriber and one dependent), \$12.00 and a family membership including subscriber and two or more dependents costs \$16.50 semi-annually. In a family membership, dependents are husband or wife and their unmarried children under nineteen years of age. Billings will be sent direct to your home address.

Full Benefits under the certificate are available in any of the participating hospitals. Leading hospitals throughout the state are included.

BLUE CROSS is the only hospital plan officially sponsored by the nation's hospitals. More than 3500 hospitals participate. It is approved by the American Hospital Association, American College of Surgeons and the Oregon Association of Hospitals.

### HOW TO APPLY

Go to your nearest school house. A BLUE CROSS representative will help you fill out your application and answer any questions. Any person under age 85 years in any enrollment and be protected with-out medical examination for benefits available in membership certificate.

In accordance with United States Government policy, the brewing industry has used no wheat whatever since March 1, 1946.

OTHER MATERIALS CUT 30%  
The other grains used have been reduced by 30%—that is, to 70% of the 1945 amount.

Wheat alone can solve the problem of feeding the hungry. The grains to which the industry is now restricted, are of a variety and grade not normally consumed by the people of the world as food.

### LESS BEER AND ALE

Altogether, the brewing industry is using 30%

less materials than in 1945. This results in a proportionately lower production. But since the current demand for beer and ale is about 25% greater than a year ago, the real shortage is nearer 50%.

Consequently, your dealer will not be able to supply you with all the beer and ale you would like. We know you will understand the reason for this.

Your attention is earnestly directed to the recommendations of President Truman's Famine Emergency Committee, which are summarized in the box below.

This statement tells in clear, simple terms what each of us individually can do to help during the emergency.

### What the President's Famine Emergency Committee asks us all to do

1. Save and share wheat and fat products . . . Go light on all foods that take wheat, fats and oils—save breads, macaroni, cakes, cookies, pastries and deep-fried foods. Use drippings for pan-frying. Save salad oil—use bottled dressings.
2. Buy and serve more plentiful foods . . . Balance diets with the more plentiful foods, such as potatoes, fresh fruits and vegetables.
3. Waste NO food . . . Dress up today's leftovers for tomorrow. Make every crust count with melba toast, crumb-toppings, bread puddings and stuffings. Take no more than you can eat. Clean your plate. Turn in unusable fat salvages promptly.
