Rolfe and Tom Fraser for the appearance of their Percheron and Belgian strings of purebred draft horses at the Puyallup show which begins September 14. The Fraser six horse hitch will appear but the Rolfe outfit has been sold to a Michigan breeder. However the halter strings of both breeders will go to the Washington fair as well as some of Fraser's saddle stock. Puyallup has one of the largest fairs in the west.

Sam Starr. Joe Peters, county commissioner, brought the flag pole from the Erskine school house yard into town Monday, preparatory to erecting it in the court house yard.

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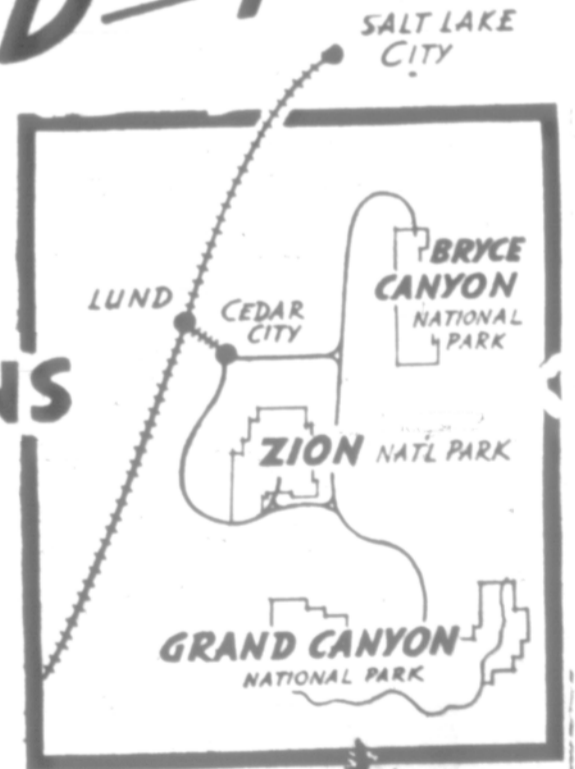
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
