Mr and Mrs Wily Knighten and son left for Portland Monday and Wily went on from there to attend the superintendent's conference in Salem for the remainder of the week.

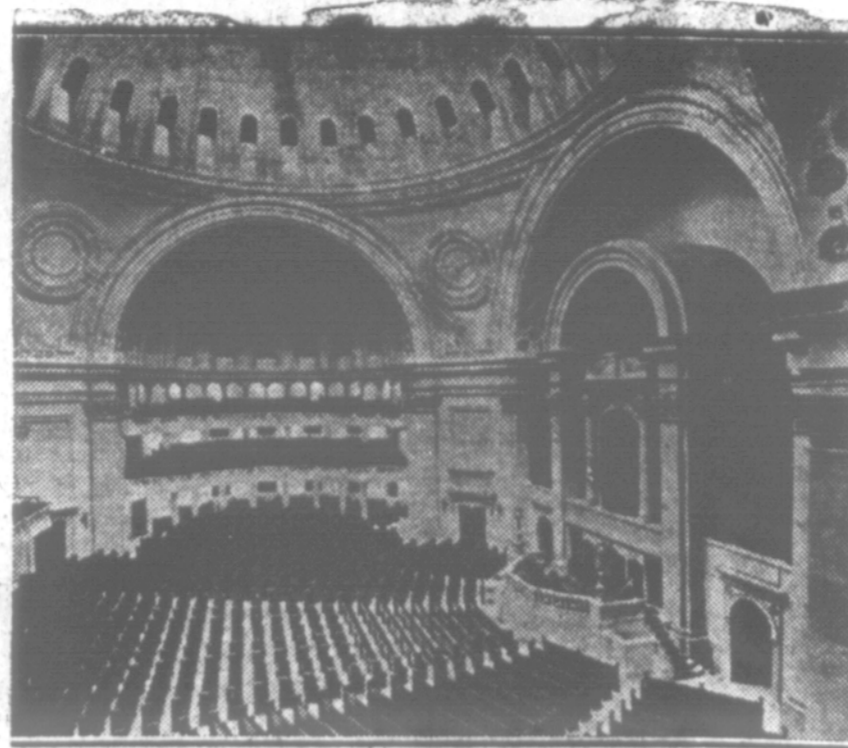
Sheriff and Mrs Norman Fields went to Salem Saturday where he met with other tax collectors to listen to an explanation of the tax laws Monday.

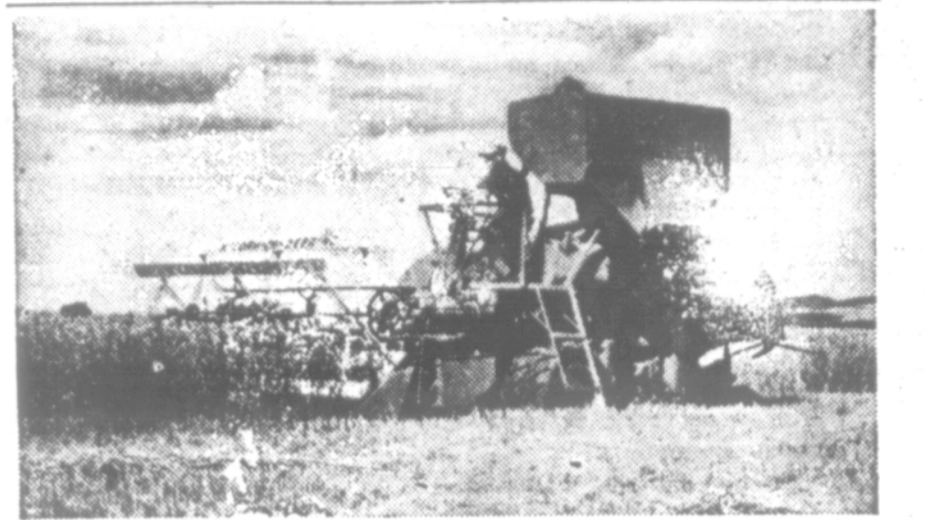
