Thousands of old time Democrats voted consistently for the new deal, running under the Democratic banner, when every dollar added to the national debt and every move toward consolidation of government in Washington, was against their actual beliefs.

It does not take a very long memory to recall the 1928 campaign when Al Smith had religious prejudice used against him so strongly that he lost some southern states, whose voters are usually swayed by racial prejudice to the other side.

Men are elected every year because of prejudices of one kind or another, geographical prejudices, job prejudices, other kinds of prejudices. Few voters can be depended upon to make a study of candidate qualifications. It is easier to vote prejudices—and to appeal to prejudices.

The background of the new deal was social prejudice. And the leader of that movement constantly appealed to the lowest prejudices of mankind by arousing the aversion of the people for governmental cumshaw.
