**FOR WALLACE**

It must be admitted that the speech of Secretary of Commerce Henry Wallace has put the Truman administration in rather a bad light, coming as it did just when Secretary of State James Byrnes had just said something almost exactly opposite. The people might get the idea that the administration had no very well established foreign policy.

That is exactly right, of course, and nothing new either for this nation has never had a well established foreign policy except in a most rudimentary form and subject to change without notice.

But our sympathies go out to Mr. Wallace and admission is freely made that he seldom receives sympathy from this quarter.

Perhaps it would have shown more loyalty to the administration of which he is a part had he kept still, but it will not hurt our democracy to have more than one point of view on foreign matters.

The policy expressed by Byrnes of opposition to Russia on most matters makes this nation look rather silly. If we knew what we wanted to do, either in Europe or China or South America, we would be in position to oppose Russia or agree with Russia or any other nation when its action damaged or aided our interests.

The United States is too great a nation to have a policy of mere opposition or mere agreement with any other power. We are not well served when the admin-

istration either follows or when it attacks without reason. Probably both Mr. Byrnes and Mr. Wallace are wrong.
