A quarter this year because the colts had not been conditioned as well as usual. W. C. Helyer's Gallant Duke was first, Lee Barnett's Redwing second and Helyer's Prince Royal third.

The 3/4 mile for three year olds was won by J. M. Wilson's Natchalia with D. Helyer's Flika and Caromak second and third. In the 1/4 mile saddle horse race Bob Belashe's Izena ran away from the field. Barnum's Silver Carpan was second and Connie Wilson's Goldie third.

In half mile county race Eugene Norton's Deadeye won with Helyer's Smitty Boy second and Roy Barnett's Getaway third. The first of the open races went to Pettigrew's Princess Rhoda with Earl Wolf's Crystal Lover and Wilbur Seeley's Dude taking the other money. The second

open race went to Bob Elliott's Fox, Pettigrew's Vegas-Nobility second and Ivan Olson's Hampton Gold third.

Sunday the race meet was more enjoyed because of improved loud speaking arrangements and because the east wind that made Saturday very uncomfortable, was absent.

Lee Barnett won the futurity, leaving W. C. Helyer's entries behind. Time Sunday was 30.9. In the 3/4 mile race for three year olds "Nasty" won again, Caromak was second and Wilson's Caledonia beat out Helyer's Flika for a place.

Bob Belashe entered his Izena in a 3/4 race Sunday and won that handily with Dunlap's Amigo second and Helyer's Queen Marie third, the time being 38.5. With Izena out of the saddle

horse race first went to Connie Wilson's Goldie with Art Barnum's entry second and Helyer's Babe third. The time was 30.0.

Roy Barnett's Getaway took the half mile race Sunday. Smitty Boy was second again and Norton's Deadeye had to be content with third. Time 54.1.

The first open race was again won by Princess Rhoda. The race was lengthened to 3/4 mile Sunday. Crystal Lover was again second and Dude third. Time was 1:24.8. The second open race, one-half mile, went to Elliott's Fox, with Delmar Acey's blue roan

second, and Glen Nelson's Mayflower third.

The chariot race went to Helyer's team the first day and the Wilson girls' team on Sunday with Vince Genteman running third both days. This race was restricted to a quarter this year for the first time in the history of the fair.

Judges for the two days races were William Brinkert, Roy Powell and Wendell Balsiger. E. A. Ragels of Baker served as starter for all races.
