Come December 31st, the UN RRA will fold up, with the exception of certain operations in the Far East. The task of relief will not be finished by the end of the current year, and there will still be many thousands of hungry people in Italy, Greece and Austria after that date. There will be a food shortage in certain other countries, but it is assumed that the Russians will take care of that situation. The Italians, Austrians and Greeks are regarded as more the province of the United States. A proposition will be submitted to congress early in January, to make another appropriation for the three countries that are more friendly to the United States and Britain than to the Soviets.

UNRRA has not been a complete success, due to its own operations, and the politicians who are in control of various countries. In China, the relief goods have fallen into the hands of racketeers and the black market instead of being distributed to the starving people of that land. One explanation is that tons of food have deteriorated laying on the docks where the goods were left by relief ships because there is no suitable means of transportation to the interior, where the food shortage is greatest. At one time, it was planned to furnish steel rails and rolling stock to rehabilitate Chinese railroads, but these articles were switched to Yugoslavia, a country which has received more UNRRA assistance than any other European country, and which has shown its gratitude by murdering up-armed fliers who piloted their planes over one edge of that country and whose dictator, Tito, has been antagonistic to the United States on all occasions, in utter disregard of the material help this country has poured into Yugoslavia.

It is also known that people who have received relief do not know that the United States has been furnishing the lion's share; a situation which is practically general. In the event that congress decides to make another appropriation for relief (not under UNRRA), the goods will be plainly marked, and every Italian, Austrian and Greek will know that it is provided by Uncle Sam. La Guardia, head man of UNRRA, will shortly resign, and will not wait for the conclusion of the program in China. If additional relief funds are supplied, congress will have to arrange a new set-up, for the handling of the food, clothing and blankets and this will mean a large organization.

Congress has been so critical of UNRRA that there will be required some high powered salesmanship to sell the idea that more relief money must be voted to keep Italy, Austria and Greece in line. There is an apprehension that unless the people of these three countries are aided, they may swing over to the communist line of thought, for a hungry individual does not care what theory of government he State department is studying a proposal of the war department to send a flotilla of long-range bombers on a good with tour around the world. The only point to be determined is what effect it would have because of political implications.

FORUM SEASON OPENS WITH SINGING STAR

Rain Nearly Normal, Still Inadequate

So far October has brought nearly as much rain as falls in the average October but no one is satisfied with it at all. Nearly everyone who had not put his grain in the ground long ago is now seeding but the moisture has not met in the ground.

Early this month 26 of an inch fell, the principal sum being 19 on the seventh. Last Saturday it began to rain and .13 inches fell followed by .15 on Sunday, .06 on Monday and .18 on Tuesday. Total for October so far is .78 compared to an average of .94.

Conditions remain favorable for rain, yet seeding conditions are not such as to suit the farmer.

In addition to the above commodity groups, county and local membership chairmen and their committees will meet at 1:00 p. m. Thursday, November 14.

The following out of state speakers will appear on the program: J. S. Jones, executive secretary of the Minnesota Farm Bureau, Harry Bryson, Western Region Organization director, as well as L. A. Rozzini, California, vice chairman of the National Livestock committee. Other speakers will be announced at a later date, as soon as confirmation has been received.

GI Standing On Loans Made Clearer By Veterans Bureau

Q. If the lender demands some security can I use the bonds I use my wife or daughter as an attendant?

A. No.

Q. I received overpayment of subsistence on my September and October checks. Should I return the amount to the VA immediately?

A. No. The VA is not yet ready to handle such returns. Rather than hold up checks and delay payments, the VA decided to continue full payments until earning reports are received. You will of course, be expected to return the money, but the time and method will be announced later. You will be given a reasonable period of time in which to make the payments.

Q. I am an honorably discharged veteran but am committed to a federal prison. Am I eligible to receive a pension?

A. Yes. The law provides, however, that an honorably discharged veteran who is being maintained by a state or subdivision thereof, may not receive in excess of \$30 monthly if pensioned for service-connected disabilities or \$8 if for non-service connected disabilities.

Q. I am a totally disabled veteran and rated as in need of reg-

Surplus Property Offers Blankets

Surplus property inventories don't contain everything, but they're apt to contain most anything, according to announcement this week from the regional office of the War Assets administration at Portland. For instance:

All-wool blankets—31,479 of them—were announced for sale today by the Portland War Assets textile division.

Numerous veterans' organizations which have inquired in the past regarding surplus blankets are expected to exercise their right to act as dealers and buy for members.

The blankets are new, 66 by 84 inches, weigh from three and three-quarters to four pounds and are the typical army type. Veterans' groups may buy one or more bundles, each bundle containing 20 blankets, at \$4.50 per blanket f.o.b. Umatilla, Oregon.

More than 7,000 gallons of war surplus paints, lacquers and canvases preservatives were placed on sale by the materials and supplies division of the Portland War Assets today. Offers to purchase will not be confirmed prior to Nov. 12, to allow for inspection. The commodities may be inspected at the WAA warehouse near Troutdale, Oregon Shipbuilding Corp., Portland, and Fort Stevens, Oregon.

FISHING END OCT. 31

The general angling season for taking of trout six inches or over will close on October 31, it is announced by the Oregon State Game commission. After that date anglers will be limited, with a few exceptions, to the taking of salmon and steelhead over 20 inches in length, jack salmon under 20 inches, and spiny-rayed fish, including bass, catfish, perch, sunfish and crappies.

Taylor of Athena will be chairman of the Taxation and Legislation committee with Ben Evick of Madras vice chairman and Vic Johnson, secretary; Henry Peterson of Ione will be chairman of the Production, Marketing and Transportation committee with Ralph McEwan Jr. of Haines as vice chairman and Jim Hill of Pendleton as secretary.

General sessions will begin December 17 at 9:30 when speakers from the USDA will discuss world marketing agreements, UNRRA, industrial use of wheat and soil conservation. Other speakers on inland waterways, world economics, northwest terminal markets, cooperatives and wheat milling are being located.

The annual banquet will be held the night of December 18, Wednesday. James Beamer of Pendleton is president, Marion Weatherford of Arlington is vice president and C. D. Conrad of Baker, secretary. Vernon Miller of Rufus is Sherman county committee man.

Conservation Tour Held Today

It is not known how many Sherman county farmers will attend the tour of Gilliam and Morrow county soil conservation area tour to be held today (Friday). It is expected that the hoped for 200 visitors will leave Arlington before ten o'clock in the morning for the Charles Nish farm to see some strip cropping and from there on to Eightmile to the Anderson place where strip cropping has been practised for several years.

During the day they will visit the Art Jaeger farm to see some trashy fallow that meets all the specifications. Soil conservation specialists will accompany the farmers and explain the advantages of saving the soil and the possibility of doing it the way now recommended. The experiments are expected to speak for themselves.
