Mrs Julia Sumner of Hood River arrived recently to visit at the home of her brother and sister in law, Mr and Mrs Charlie Anderson.

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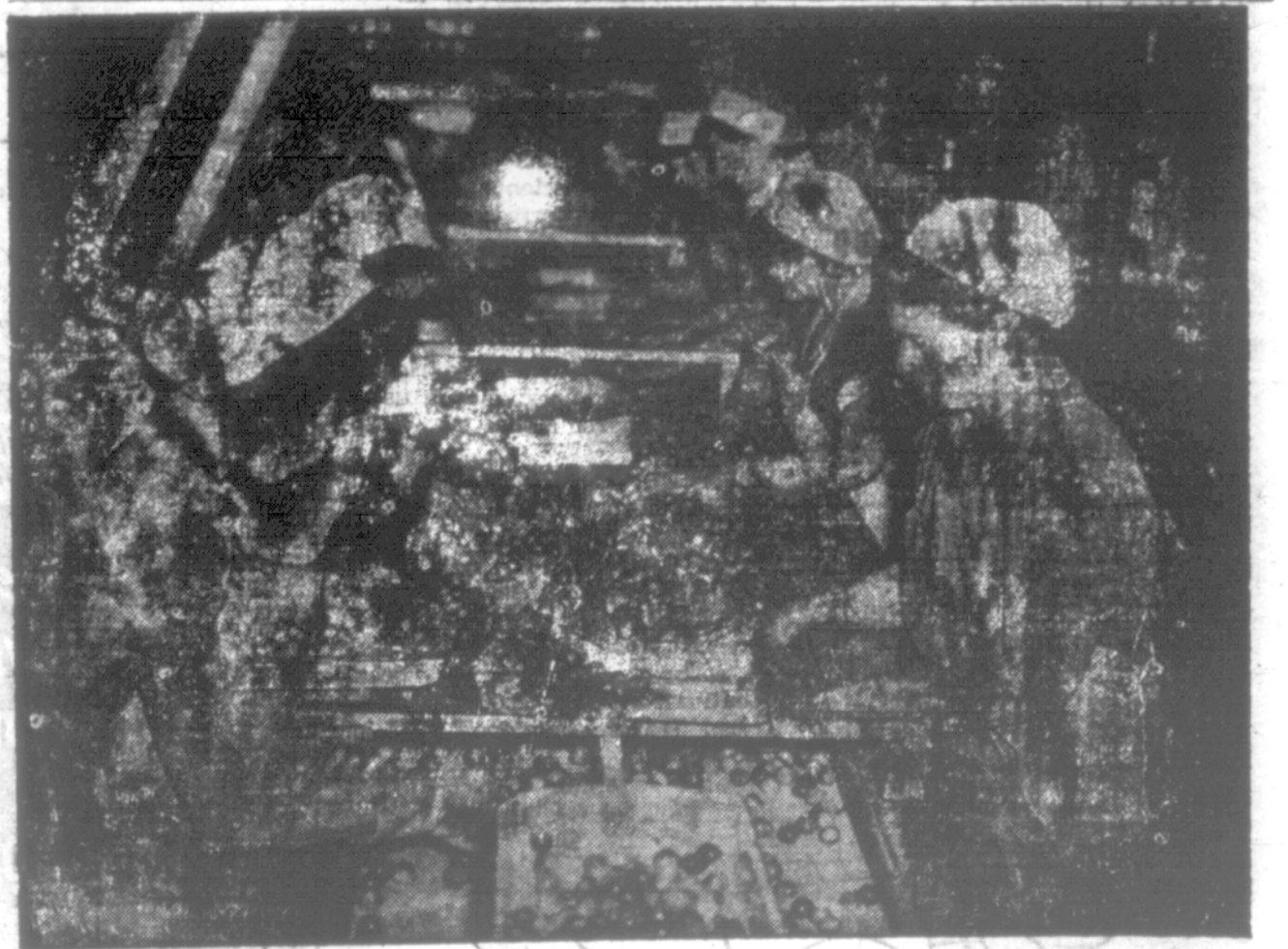
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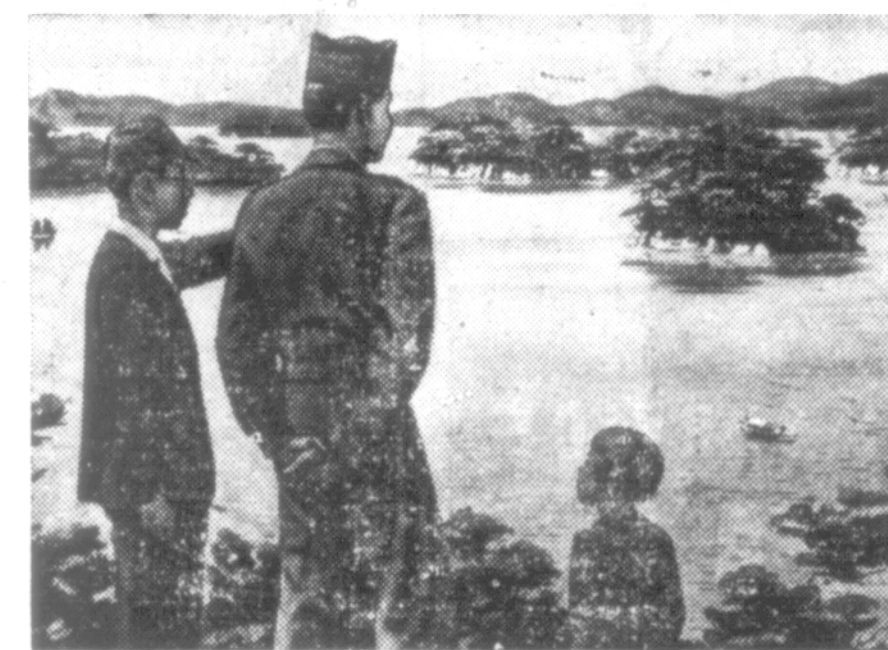


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
