**FOOTBALL SEASON**

The football season is ended, that is, unless a post season game can be arranged, and that is considered unlikely.

From the point of wins and losses it was not so successful as that of 1945 when the local boys were runners-up to the state B- championship. But we think there is general agreement that the competition was tougher this year and that the team played better ball. A few defeats do not spoil a football season even to youths who love to win.

The boys played well, no one was seriously injured, a majority of the games were won. The season was successful.

**THE RIGHT TO STRIKE**

For years, 14 to be exact, there has been no official questioning of the right to strike. Any labor leader or any disgruntled group, could call a strike for 30 minutes or 30 days and obtain government support in the effort.

But we were forgetting that if we are to have government at all there must be some limitation on individual and group rights. It is assumed that one has a right to say what he thinks, anytime, anyplace. Yet that is modified by the responsibility that goes with it—the libel laws, the more physical results. One has a right to drive a car on any road, whenever he desires, but he must not endanger others, nor proceed at a reckless rate.

There is limitation to nearly all of our rights, a limitation that must be made lest the aggressors take advantage of the main body of the citizenry.

Limitation on the right to strike has long been necessary and with John Lewis making his persistent challenges to the public it is time to do it now. There is nothing in our constitution that gives such a right.

Working men must have a means of bettering their conditions and collective bargaining is an orderly means to that end. They must not be made to work at wages or under conditions that are unfair.

The right of employers to withhold adjustments may also go along with the right to strike. In any event our civilization can not be menaced by labor disputes that freeze people, deprive them of food, light and shelter and stop production over a wide area. Too many people are involved to give either side an inviolate right to stop production.

Clement Atlee, premier of Great Britain, is raising a fund to erect a statue of Franklin D. Roosevelt in Grosvenor Square, London, in honor of the services performed for England by the late president. How appropriate.

**JUDGE McKEE**

Except for a meeting or two E. D. McKee has completed 80½ years of public service, 45 years for his city, 15 years for his school district and 20½ years for the county. In addition to that he has been a leading citizen in many other posts. He is leaving his official positions at the end of the year, but will continue as sage and advisor of those who ask his aid.

His is an enviable record and this is not meant as a summing up of it. The completion of his official career does, however, make it possible to say that upon such men is our democracy founded. He is one who has helped make self government work. Without men willing to give their time, their effort, their thought, there would be no government of the people, by the people, for the people. And dictators would, of necessity, take over the functions—and rewards—of power.

Now let's find out whether John Lewis is going to run the country or if the government will run it. We'd just as soon not compromise it either.
