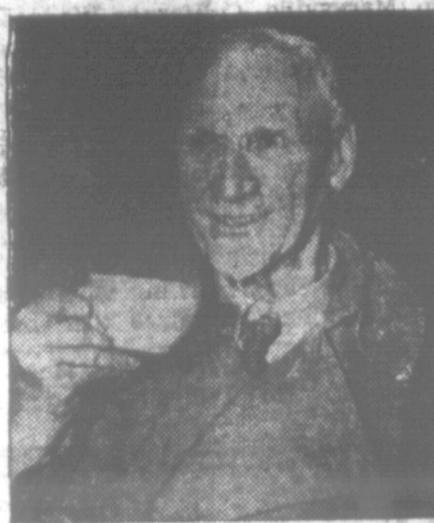

GAS SALES HIGH
Oregon motorists burned a record 250,000,000 gallons of gasoline in the first nine months of this year, it has been announced by Secretary of State Robert Farrell Jr.

This fuel is estimated to have carried them three and a third billion miles.

Taxes on the record fuel sale netted the state \$12,394,923, even after refunds had been made to non-highway users. This is a 62 percent over last year. Gross sales for the month of September alone amounted to almost 36,000,000 gallons.

"It's not hard to see how huge a scale traffic problems have assumed," said Farrell, "when you find Oregon drivers piling up almost half a billion miles a month on the highway of the state."

September's consumption was the third largest for any month this year, with August and July taking first and second place respectively.

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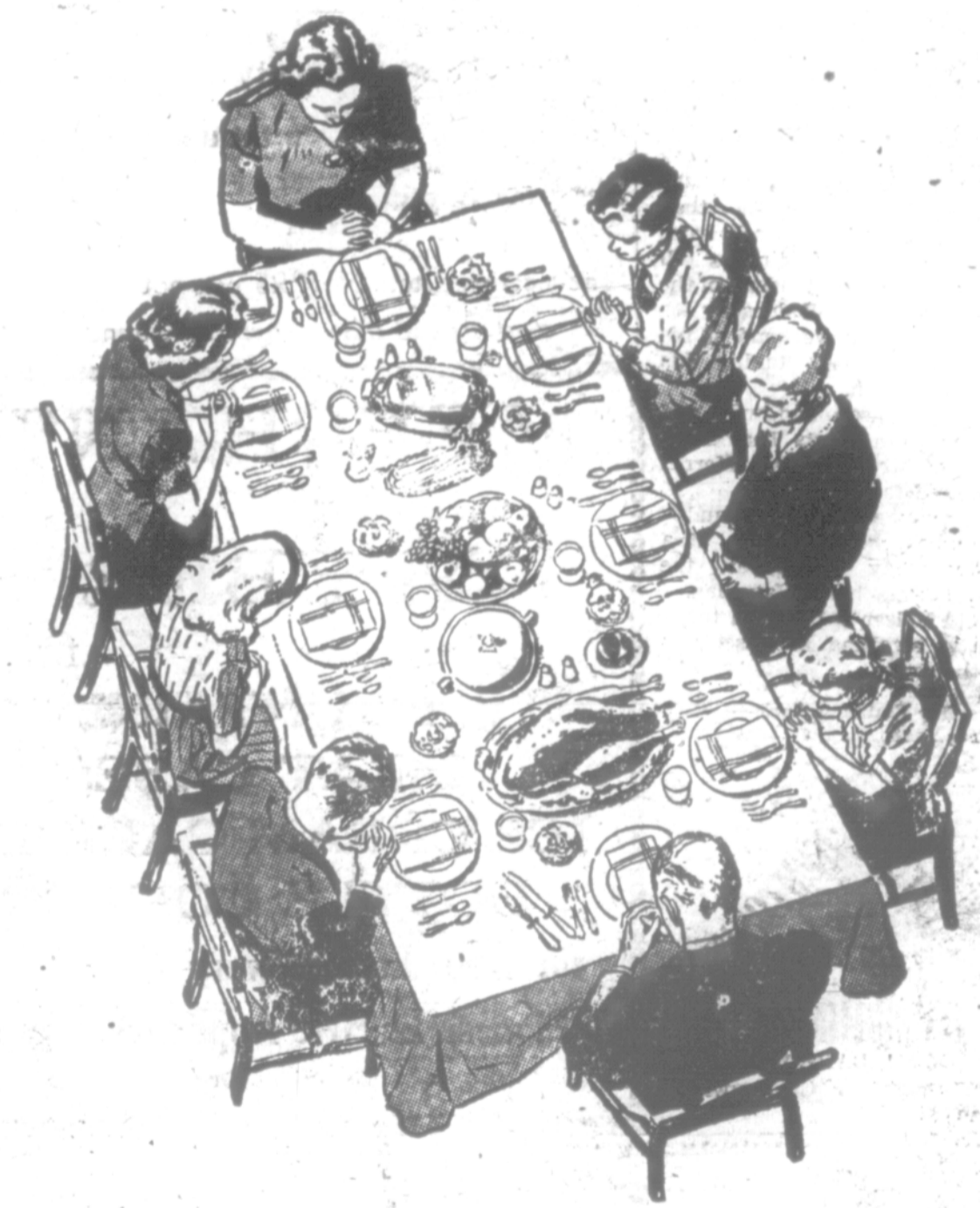
