Nitrogen Fertilizer Now In Use

Use of nitrogen fertilizer as a soil builder is proving popular with county AAA committeemen in the selection of local practices to be offered under the 1947 agricultural conservation program, reports E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the state PMA committee.

So far at least seven counties have selected application of nitrogen as the local practice that may be offered in the county in addition to practices chosen from the state handbook. After consultation with the technical advisers, the state committee has approved practice payments for use of nitrogen on new pasture seedings, on green manure crops at the time of seeding, and on grain straw and stubble to promote decomposition.

Also approved by the state committee is a local practice in one county providing program assistance for use of 2, 4-D to eradicate whitetop.

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NO VETERAN PREFERENCE Veterans no longer can obtain preference over buyers of new farm machinery and equipment. Termination of WFO 135, the regulation which authorized county AAA committees to issue preference certificates to veterans, has been announced by E. H. Miller, chairman of the state PMA committee.

December 9 was the final date for the issuance of new certificates. Outstanding certificates now held by about 2500 Oregon veterans cannot be renewed beyond

February 8, Miller reported. Since the program started in July, 1945, some 5700 preference certificates have been issued in the state, only about one-third of which have been satisfied and the machinery delivered.

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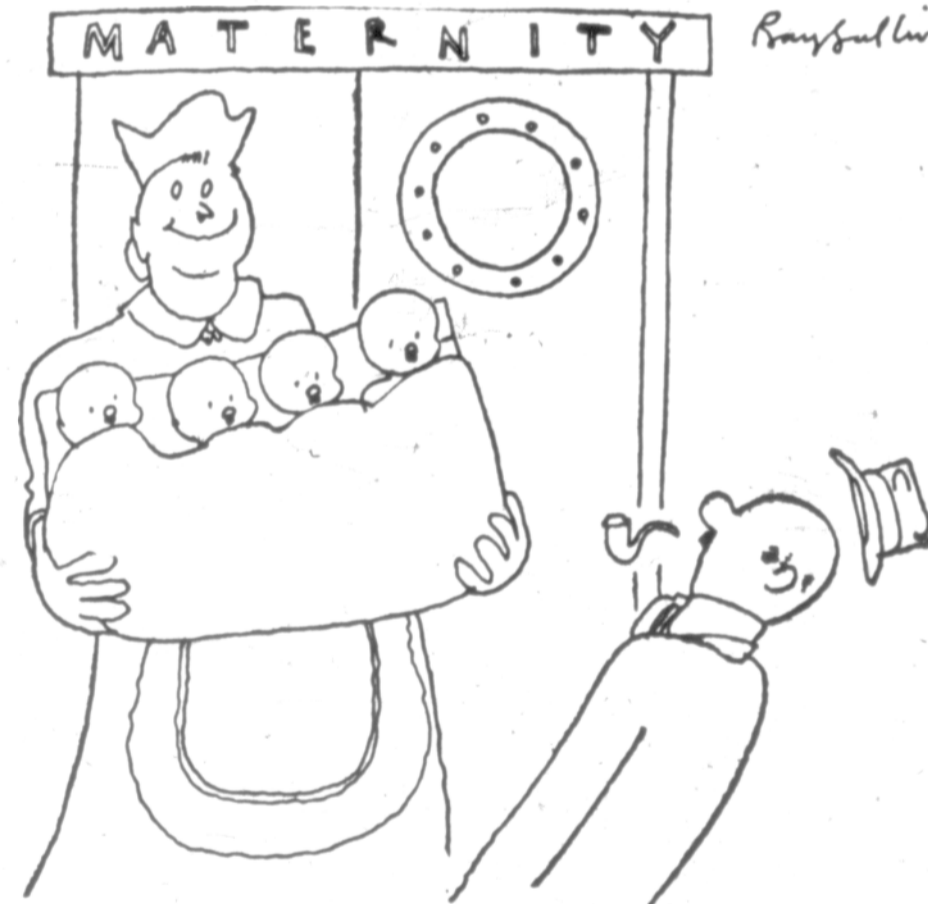
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
