## Aircraft Removed From Priorities

Because of long supply and relatively small current demand, sur-plus twin-engine Douglas C-47 type transports and single-engine liaison aircraft will be removed from priorities effective February 10, War Assets administration an-nounced today.

On and after that date, the usual regulations governing the sale of long-supply aircraft will apply to these two types and it will not be necessary to present a priority certificate at storage fields to make purchases. All planes are price-tagged and will be sold on a first come, first served basis.

There are 36 C-47 type trans-ports still in surplus stocks, 27 at Bush Field, Augusta, Ga., and nine at Cal-Aero Field, Ontario, Calif. Prices range from \$15,000 up to \$40,000, depending upon model and condition.

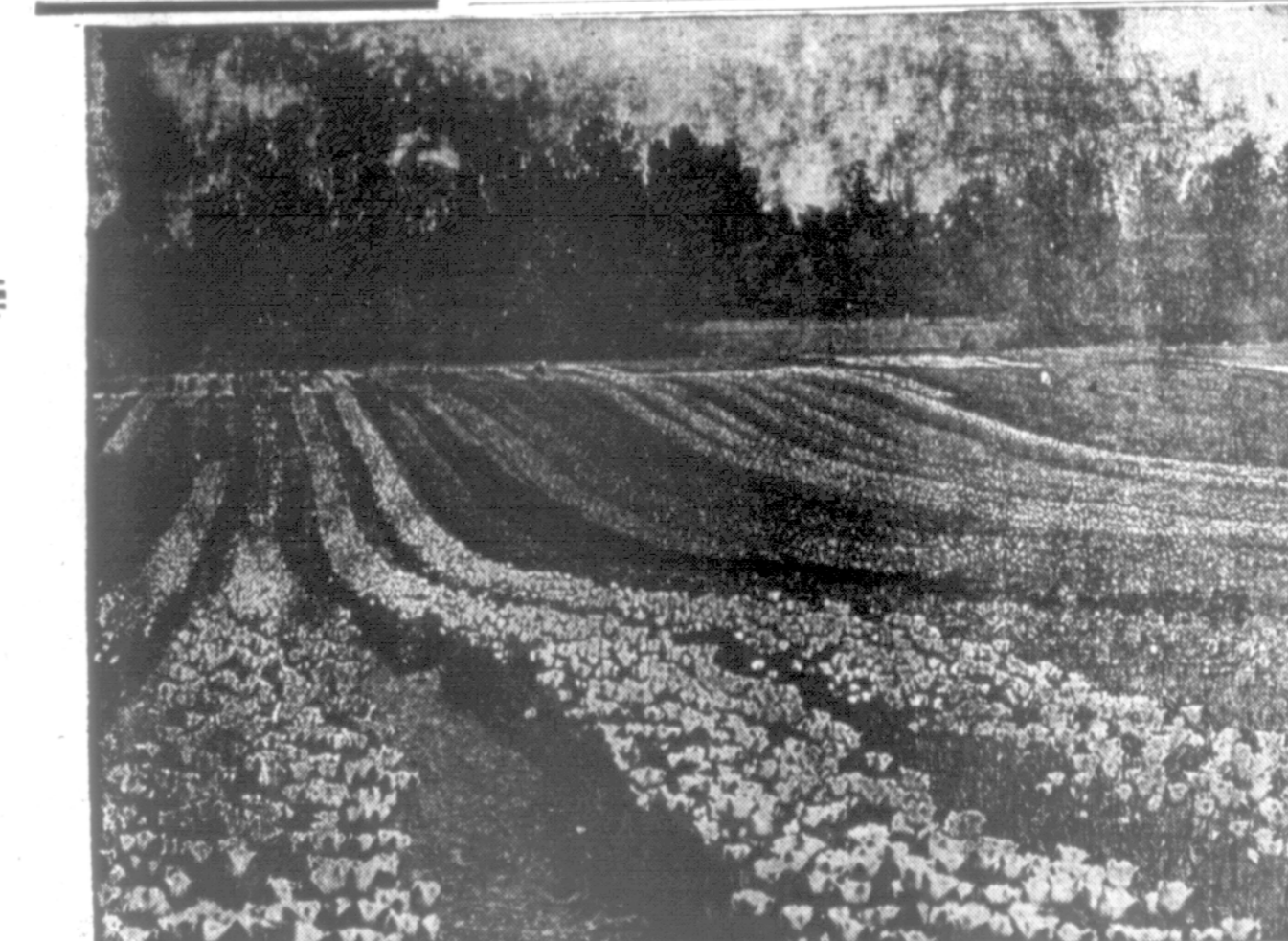
