GIs were confined. The prisoners
were submitted to brutal treat-
ment which grew into a scandal
when some enlisted men, acting
as guards, testified. They recounted
tales of lashing with whips, the
tying up of prisoners by the wrists
and other means of torture.

These guards were convicted by
court martial and fined, but it was
not until later that it leaked out
that Killian had given orders to
be tough with the prisoners.
When Killian was court martialled
he almost squirmed out of it and
might have escaped except for the
publicity. Finally, he was found
guilty and fined \$500, a mild pun-
ishment compared with that han-
ded out by the guards. Under the
seniority rules Killian was pro-
posed for promotion despite his
court martial for brutality and this
razed fierce opposition from GIs
and some members of the senate.
His court martial record will be
submitted to the military affairs
committee.
