A job in the new Regular Army compares favorably with the average in industry, and has more opportunities for promotion than most.

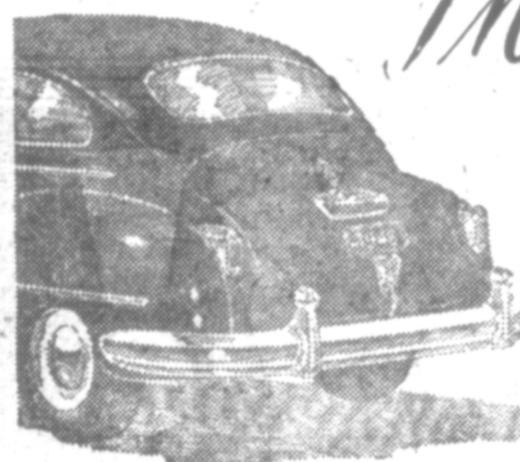

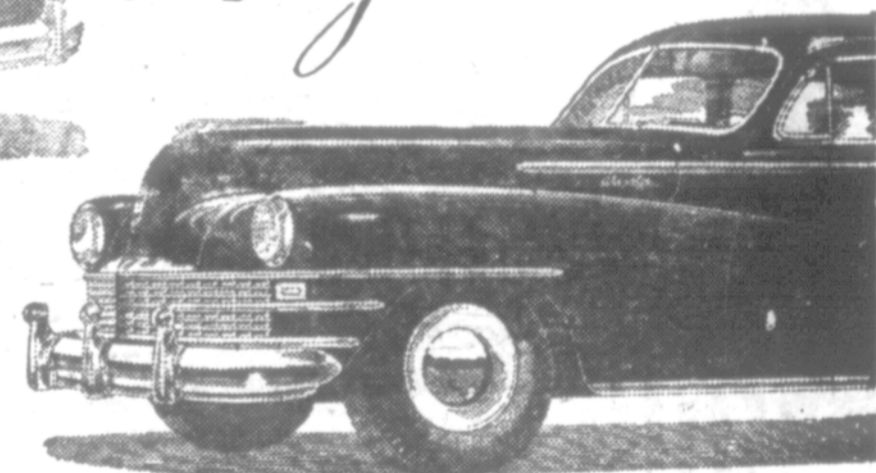

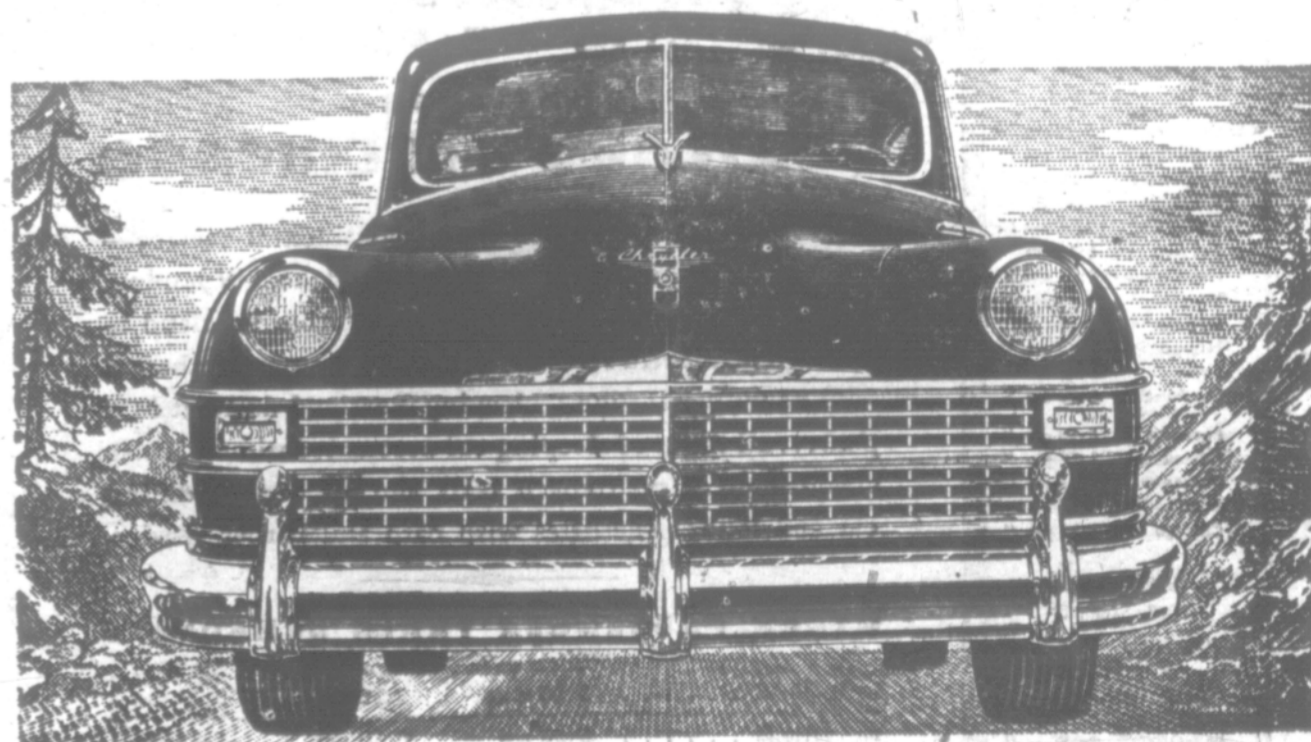
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
