have applied for educational ben-
efits. The total number of war
II veterans is placed at 14,447,900
by the veterans Administration
As of April 1, there were 1,884,
000 veterans enrolled in more
than 25,000 educational institu-
tions and 720,000 were taking on-
job training in about 365,000 fac-
tories, offices and on farms. An-
other 835,000 veterans had com-
pleted or discontinued their courses
when the last check was
made by veterans administration.
Veterans of world war I, whose
average age is now 54, are laying
their plans to obtain a monthly
pension. Better than 70 percent
of the membership of American
Legion and Veterans Foreign
Wars are world war I veterans,
whose benefits are way below
those received by veterans of the
last war. The American Legion
is a very potent organization and
its lobby, which has been main-
tained at the national capital
since 1919, knows how to get
things done for the veterans.

HOME TOWN RESPECT
It's bad enough to see some
stranger who perhaps comes from
some larger town, back around
corners or commit some other
traffic violation. (Americans think
big things are naturally better
than small ones) Strangers may
be expected to hold less respect
for our town than they would
have for their own.
But when citizens who live
here perpetrate such tricks it in-
dicates a lack of respect for their
own home town. And that is inex-
cusable.

CAMP WHITE
A Portland newspaper and a
Portland state senator are trying
to start a campaign to force the
state to take over Camp White in
Jackson county. A bill to do that
was passed by both houses of the
legislature, vetoed by Governor
Snell, and the veto was upheld in
the senate.
The constitution says that all
state institutions must be located
in Marion county, which isn't
such a bad provision when it is
fully considered. That means
that if the state is going to legally
take over Camp White as an in-
stitution it must be by vote of the
people. The proposed initiative
petition followed by a favorable
vote of the people, is the only legal
means of acquiring the land
and buildings that comprise Camp
White.
The board of control, governor,
secretary of state and treasurer,
all signed a statement saying that
costs of rehabilitating Camp
White could be greater than would
be needed to build similar and
more suitable quarters near Sal-
em and that costs of administra-
tion would be smaller.
It is contemplated that Camp
White might be used to house
