Oregon school lunch programs have received foodstuffs valued at more than \$100,000 during the present school year, according to a report from the state PMA committee on the U. S. department of agriculture's direct distribution program.

Commodities distributed included potatoes, onions, canned fruits and jams, concentrated fruit juices, canned vegetables and cheese. Some of the commodities were acquired in supporting prices to producers, others were from army surplus stocks, and some were purchased with federal school lunch funds.

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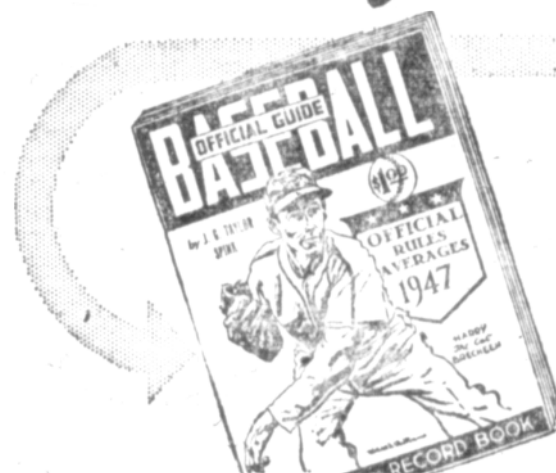

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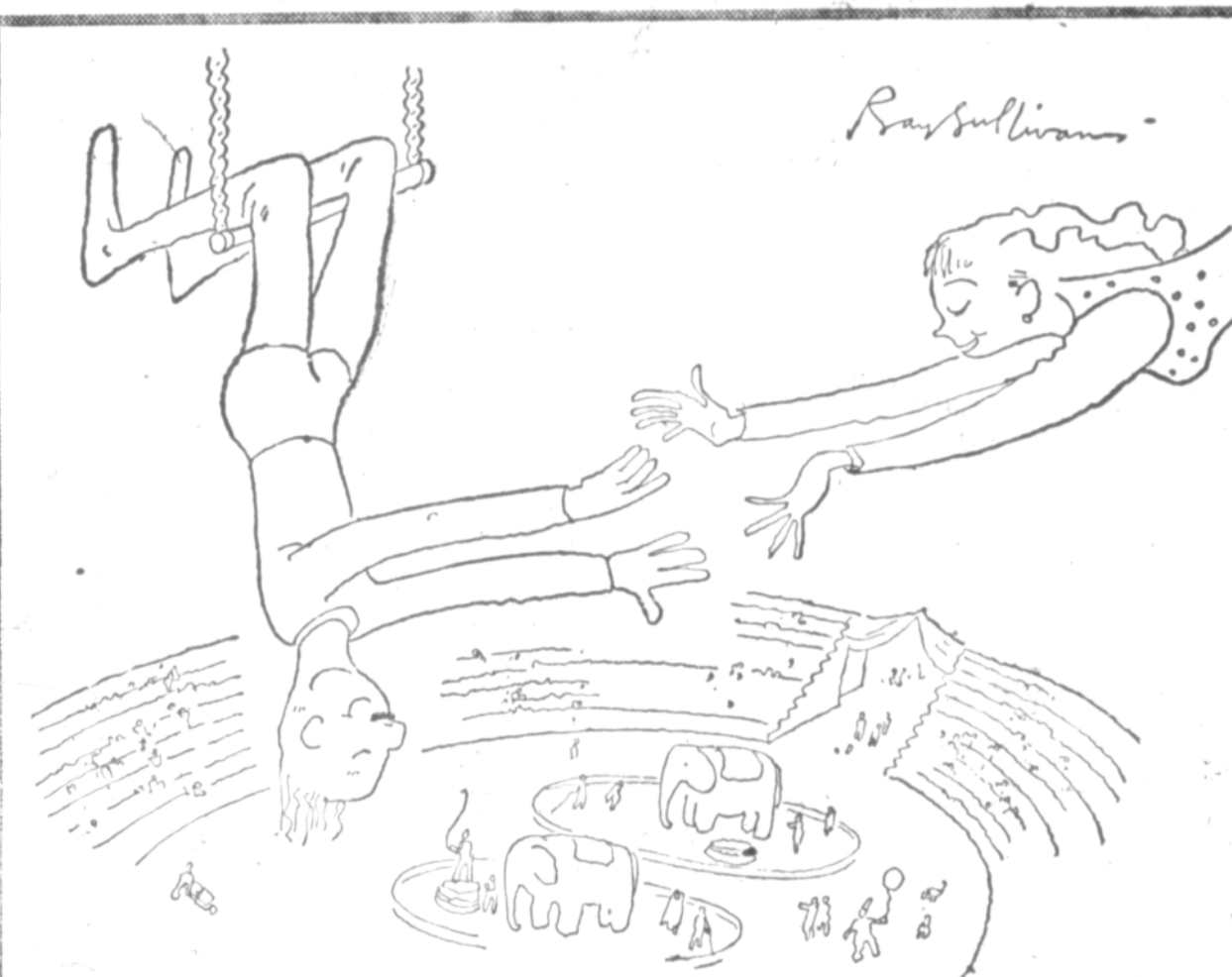
