Cold Storage Locker Law Soon Effective

Refrigerated locker plant operators throughout Oregon have been advised of specifications for recording thermometers to be used under the new Oregon locker law, which goes into effect July 5. The law is a sanitary and protective measure and calls for uniformity in locker refrigeration. It provides for licensing of all plants, with the annual license fee from \$10 to \$25, depending upon number of lockers.

An essential feature is the requirement that each plant be equipped with accurate controls to maintain uniform temperature. The chambers must be within four degrees above zero, with a 10-degree tolerance 24 hours after fresh food is put in. A maximum locker room temperature of 12 degrees F. plus is allowed plants now in operation, but for locker plants built after July 5
