Ronny May left Sunday for a coast vacation of about two weeks.

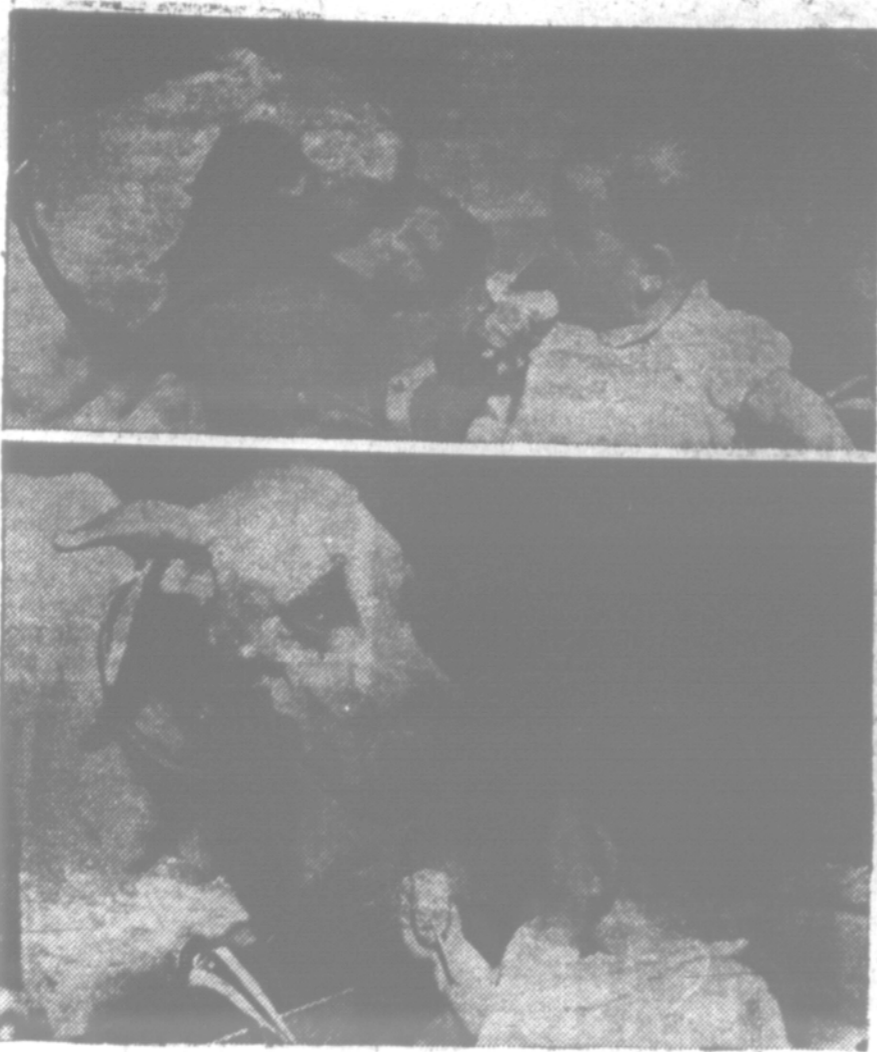
The children attending 4-H summer school in Corvallis returned today after spending two weeks there.

New Brand Law Concerns All Stock Shippers

The 1947 livestock brand inspection code which goes into effect July 5 contains changes of interest to all Oregon livestockmen, according to M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the animal division of the state department of agriculture. It applies to the movement of cattle, horses and mules.

The new law places all counties east of the Cascades, and Jackson, Josephine and Multnomah counties, in the state brand inspection area. Included also are public markets posted under the federal packers and stockyards act of 1921 in which the director of agriculture has filed as a market agency.

Inspections will be handled on a district basis, with the inspection area to be divided into six districts. The director of agriculture will name a supervisor for each district, and the supervisor will name his own deputies. Supervisors are being selected now from a list supplied by the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association. The law sets the brand inspection fee at 10 cents per head within Oregon.

The point at which brand inspection must be made is determined by the destination and the means of conveyance. The law requires that livestock moved by truck or trailer within the brand inspection area to an open market area must be accompanied by a transportation certificate which shows brands, marks and other identifications; this certificate will be filled out by the owner or custodian and must be delivered to the brand inspector at destination.

If livestock is moved by rail, the carrier must be provided with a brand inspection certificate.

By any mode of transportation if the stock is being moved out of the state brand inspection must be made before the livestock is loaded.

Brand inspection is required at all livestock auction markets within the brand inspection area and owners of such markets are responsible for collection of brand inspection fees. A further protection to stock owners is provided in the requirement that no livestock sales may be made at a public stockyard or auction sales yard if the livestock is not accompanied by a brand inspection certificate.

In all instances, owners or custodians of livestock presented for brand inspection must provide proof of ownership. Inspectors not satisfied as to ownership of stock presented for inspection

have seizure powers. Violators of the brand inspection code are subject, upon conviction, to a fine of up to \$500 or a county jail sentence up to six months, or both.
