Pendleton, Aug. 26—A princess of the Pendleton Round-Up in 1946, Patti Folsom, 18, skilled rider, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Folsom, will be queen of the 1947 show, Sept. 10-13.

Queen Patti the First, whose father is grounds director of the Round Up, has been a rider since she was six years old, her first horse being a pinto Shetland "Jack." In 1942, with Marilyn Glenn, a former Round-Up princess, she placed second in the three-gaited pairs at the Mustang Horse Show. In 1944 she won first in this event, riding with Mrs. Roy Harris.

Now a sophomore at the University of Oregon where she is majoring in business administration, Queen Patti is a Delta Gamma. In high school days here she was business manager of the Lantern, president of Phoenix club and Quill and Scroll, member of the National Honor Society, Theatricals and student council. Her hobbies are skiing, dancing, tennis, swimming and keeping scrapbooks.
