The city pump stopped pumping sometime Wednesday afternoon and pump repair men from Portland came Thursday morning to take it from the well and overhaul it. Estimate on time pumping could begin again was Friday morning.

The water committee put new restrictions into effect for the interim and householders will oblige the city and their neighbors by being careful in use of water.

The well drill has penetrated to a depth of 120 feet and is in hard rock, which is to be expected for perhaps 100 feet more.

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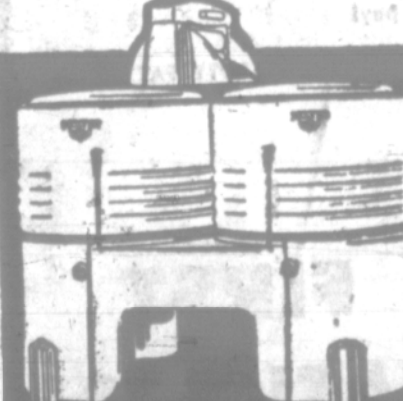
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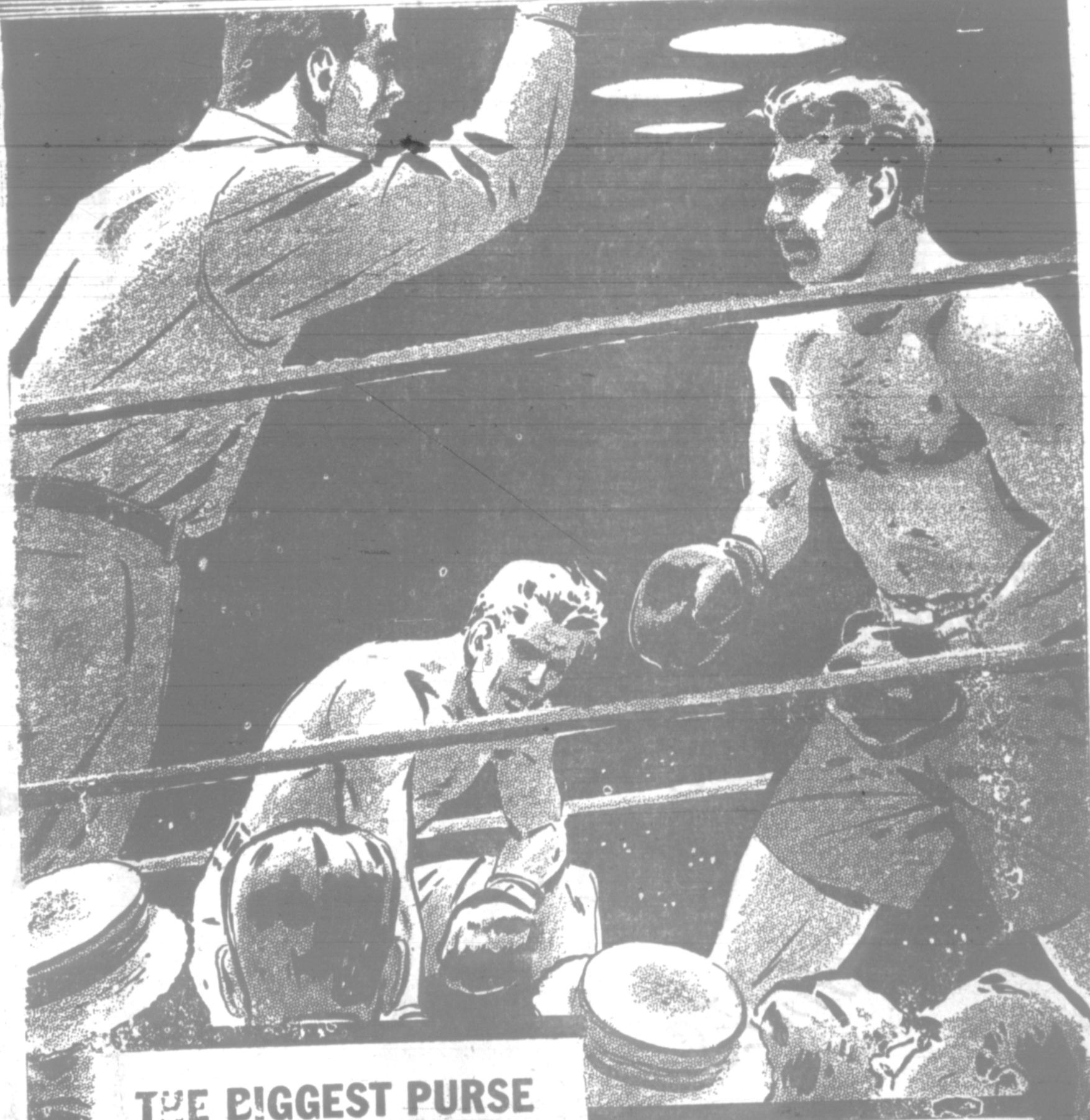
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
