SPECIALTY CROPS BIG NOW

The increasing importance of specialty crops, in Oregon is shown by an analysis of acreage data by extension economists at OSC. The analysis shows a long-time upward trend in cropland used for crops other than grain and hay. Even so, there was more land in grain in 1947 than usual, and about as much in hay as usual.

The figures available indicate that 38.8 percent of Oregon's cropland is occupied this year by grain crops for harvest. Hay crops occupy about 25.5 percent and

other crops 15.7 percent. These other crops include a long list of seed crops, truck crops, fruit and nuts, numerous horticultural specialty crops, various other specialty crops, and crops such as potatoes, sugar beets and others.

The balance of the cropland is in fallow, except such acreage as there may be of crop failure or merely idle cropland. Only about 20 percent appears to be so classified this year, scarcely two-thirds of the usual amount from 1919 to 1939.

The acreage of hay in Oregon has changed very little over a long period of years. The data show that generally 25 to 26 percent of the cropland has been in hay. Meanwhile, crops other than grain and hay increased from 5.1 percent in 1919 to 7.5 percent in 1929, 11.0 percent in 1939, 15.4 percent in 1944, and 15.7 percent in 1947.

At 38.8 percent this year, Oregon's cropland in grain compares with 35.2 percent in 1944, and 31.8 percent in 1939. In the three Pacific northwest states combined, wheat acreage for harvest this year is 17 percent above the 1935-1939 average and 36 percent above 1940-1944.

The extension service has just issued a new circular with additional outlook information on wheat and other fall-sown crops. The information is intended to assist farm families to judge the future better and aid them in planning their production and marketing operations. The circular is available free from county agricultural agents or direct from Oregon State college.
