But, humankind is not so perverse as are inanimate things. By what stretch of the imagination can one appreciate the fact that the city well drill struck a supply of water at almost the moment the presses started to roll? It hadn't been an hour since the depth was checked.

Well, it doesn't make a bit of difference what time of week one establishes a dead-line, events occur immediately after that hour. Yet it is a matter of no little pride that family's only grand child appropriately chose to be born early Thursday morning. That, we maintain, is evidence of good newspaper training.

We do so wish that it would be possible to determine the communistic activities of Hollywood publicity seekers without giving them the advantage of the United States Senate as a forum. They do much better under the Kleig lights than do the investigators themselves and they seemingly care not a whit whether found guilty or not as long as they appear in enough headlines and enough pictures.

It is the people's law. They passed, or rather confirmed it, by a vote of 150,157 to 258,010. Let it be enforced or repealed.

Rain Soaks Fields Again; Thrice Normal Falls

Well over three times the normal amount of moisture for the first two months of the crop year has fallen on Sherman county since September 1 as the storm that began September 27 seems ready to abate and let farmers go on with their interrupted seeding of fall grain.

Within the past week an inch and a quarter of rain has come to soak the already well dampened fields until water ran down all the draws and filled the ditches.

Seeding was entirely stopped and it will be next week before everyone can get into the fields with machinery. Killing of weeds is still a serious problem and weeds are growing rapidly in most of the fields already sown, farmers report.

Rainfall coming since the even half inch that fell Wednesday night of last week has been .06 on the 17th; .14 on the 18th; .03 on the 19th; .99 on the 20th; .02 on the 21st; .06 on the 22nd.

Since the first of September a total of 4.96 inches have fallen whereas the average for the two months is 1.61. There was 1.95 in September and 3.01 in October.

City Drill Finds Water; Test Due

The well drill found water last Thursday afternoon at a depth of 282 feet but drilling continued to the 288 foot mark when it was found that 42 feet of water was in the well.

A test will be made as soon as equipment can be obtained, probably the last of this week or the first of next. At that time the city will decide what to do about pumping facilities or further drilling.

Huskies Hardly Hard Enough For Madras Buffaloes

After having played the Buffaloes on even terms for the first half, the Moro Huskies were overwhelmed by a score of 12 to 34 during the second half of a football game played at Madras Friday, October 17. Passes, pass interception, excellent blocking and an elusive Madras back, Rod Rodman, spelled five touchdowns and two conversions for the Buffaloes.

Rodman ran wild the last half, chalking up an average of 10 yards per line play including runs of 38, 27, 23 and 20 yards. In addition, he ran an intercepted pass back 55 yards to a touchdown and was on the receiving end of a couple of passes.

Although both Peters and Thompson were able to make several nice gains on pass plays when choosing to run after being blanketed by Madras linemen, they were also tackled for several losses before they could pass the ball. Moro made but one first down in the second half. Fred vonBorstel made good yardage several times on kick off plays.

Hartley returned the opening kick-off 15 yards to the 35. After a series of line plays, Moro was forced to kick. On the second play, Delaney, Buffalo right half, traveled 67 yards to the Moro 5 yard line. The Huskies luckily recovered a fumble on their own 9.

Oveson kicked out to the 37 where the Madras receiver fumbled the ball and Scott Fritts recovered. The local boys then marched all the way to the goal with the aid of three passes by Peters, one to Oveson and two snagged by Joe Harvey.

The Buffaloes drove from their own 29 yard line to score, principally through long runs by Rodman. A completed pass added the conversion point to put Madras ahead 7 to 6.

The Huskies received another break in the second quarter when Rodman fumbled on his own 30 yard line. Hartley recovered and Moro scored six plays later. Madras scored just at the end of the first half on a thirty yard pass and three end runs.

During the third period the Husky backfield lost a large amount of yardage on attempted passes when Buffaloes came swarming through the line. Madras scored after placing the ball on the two yard line from two long passes. Early in the fourth quarter Madras collected two more points when a Husky back failed to catch a difficult backward pass and fell on the ball behind the goal line for a safety. Intercepted passes were responsible for the final two Madras scores.

Madras netted 270 yards and 7 first downs from scrimmage, completed four out of eight attempted passes for 81 yards and four first downs and intercepted three Husky passes. Because of several large losses Moro netted only 38 yards although making four first downs from scrimmage.

The Huskies completed five out of twelve attempted passes for 73 yards and three first downs. The starting line-up was:

A conference on agricultural, economic and social affairs of Sherman county will be held sometime in the latter part of next January. So decided a group of men and women who met at the court house Monday upon call of County Agent LeRoy Wright and extension workers at the college.

The last conference was held here in 1938 and although many of the actions agreed upon at that time have been taken, not all have been done. Not all will find favor at this time in all probability.
