LICENSES EXPIRE

Oregon motorists are not taking complete advantage of the state's new driver's license system, it has been revealed by Robert S. Farrell Jr., secretary of state. Several thousand void permits are still in use.

"The legislature enacted the new driver's license system largely as a matter of convenience to the motoring public," Farrell said.

Under the new system approximately 33,000 old permits become void each month. All those numbered below 5R-132,000 are invalid, and those numbered between 5R-132,000 and 5R-165,000 expire this month.

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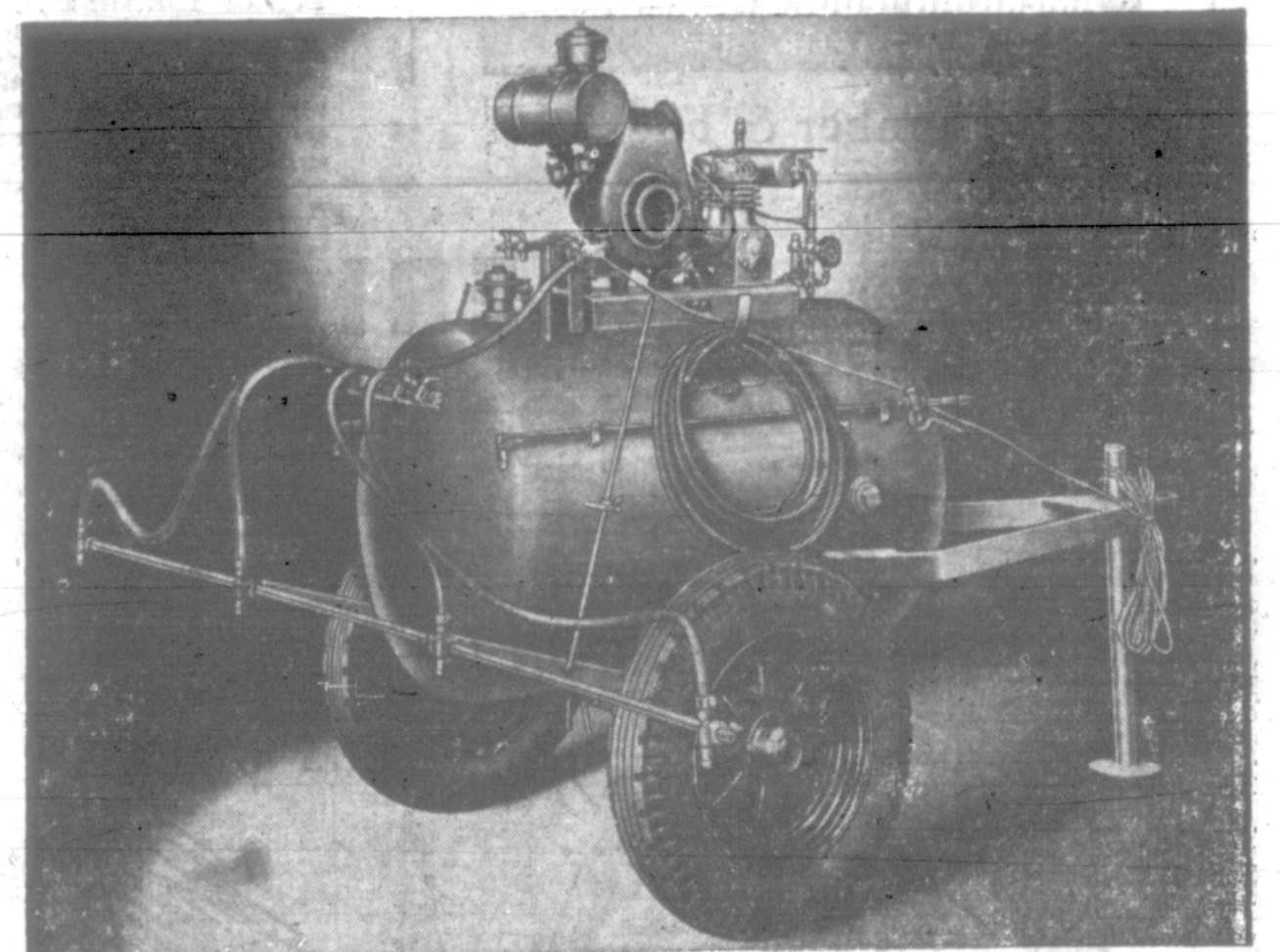


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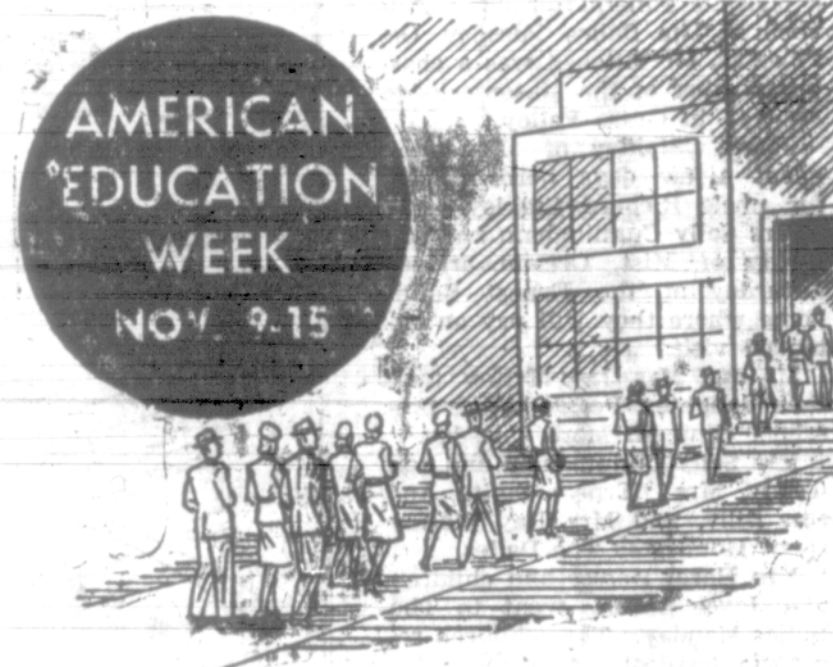
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 4. FOUR CYCLE, BALL BEARING EQUIPPED, AIRCOOLED ENGINE.

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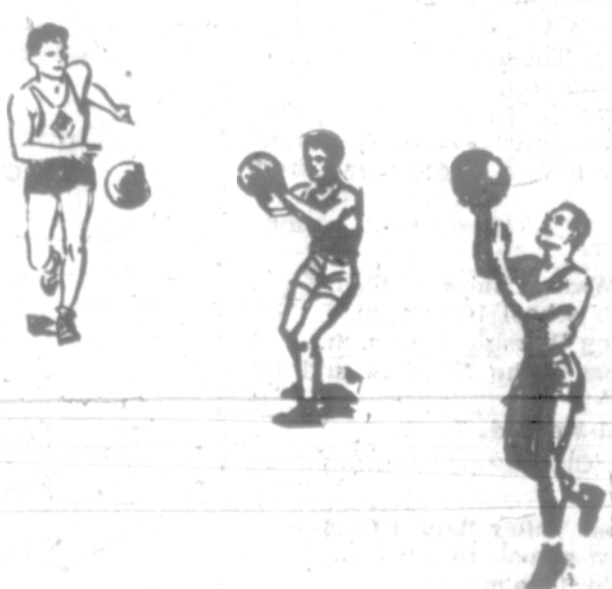
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
