Quite a few Moro folks went to The Dalles Armistice day to see The Dalles High school team trim the Hood River Dragons by a 51 to 0 score.

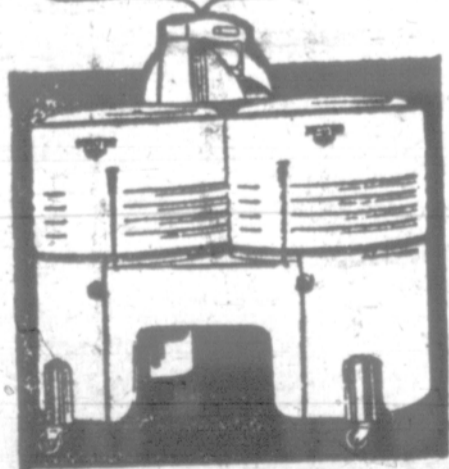

**ORANGE BUTTERMILK**  
1 cup strained orange juice  
¼ tsp. grated orange rind  
¼ cup sugar  
3 cups cold fresh pasteurized buttermilk

Put all ingredients into a shaker and shake vigorously for a few seconds. Serve immediately with or without a little chipped ice. (Serves 4)

**Buttermilk Corn Muffins**  
1 cup flour ¼ cup sugar  
1 tsp baking powder ½ tsp soda  
1 cup cornmeal 1 egg  
1 cup buttermilk  
2 tbs butter 1 tsp salt

Sift flour, measure, sift with sugar, baking powder, soda and salt. Combine with cornmeal. Beat the egg and add buttermilk and melted butter. Combine with flour mixture and mix lightly. Fill buttered muffin pans ¾ full. Bake in a hot oven 425 degrees for 15 minutes. Makes 12 muffins. For variety, sprinkle tops of muffins with slightly cooked diced bacon before baking.

## HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

Buttermilk has been a favored beverage as long as butter has been churned. Originally, buttermilk was the liquid remaining after butter had been churned from cream, hence the name "buttermilk". Today, most of the commercial buttermilk is made by skimming artificially fresh, skim or whole milk. This is done by adding a culture of acid-forming bacteria and finally stirring it thoroughly to break up the curd.

For buttermilk lovers, there is nothing more refreshing, more delicious, more refreshing, than a glass of cool, tangy buttermilk on a hot summer day. Its delightful cool tartness is not only delightful to taste, but is also hearty and satisfying to the palate. Buttermilk is a highly nutritious beverage which many homemakers are apt to overlook entirely when buying dairy foods for their families. It has a low calorie content, which will please those who are calorie conscious, yet is

rich in minerals, protein and vitamins.

Buttermilk is economical too. Like milk, it is equally versatile whether served as a beverage or used in cooking. And speaking of cooking, buttermilk gives a feather lightness to muffins, waffles, cupcakes and cookies. Have you ever tasted buttermilk pie? Or buttermilk sherbet or custard? There is many a treat in store for those who discover the advantages of cooking with buttermilk.

But, a word to the wise about cooking with buttermilk. It may be used in recipes where sour milk is called for, but don't forget that both sour milk and buttermilk are thicker than sweet milk and more of these liquids are required to moisten dry ingredients. Generally, 1¼ cups buttermilk or sour milk to 1 cup sweet milk is the rule. We have two buttermilk recipes
