Mr and Mrs Ted Smith and son and Wren Hogue of Chillicothe spent the week end here on business.

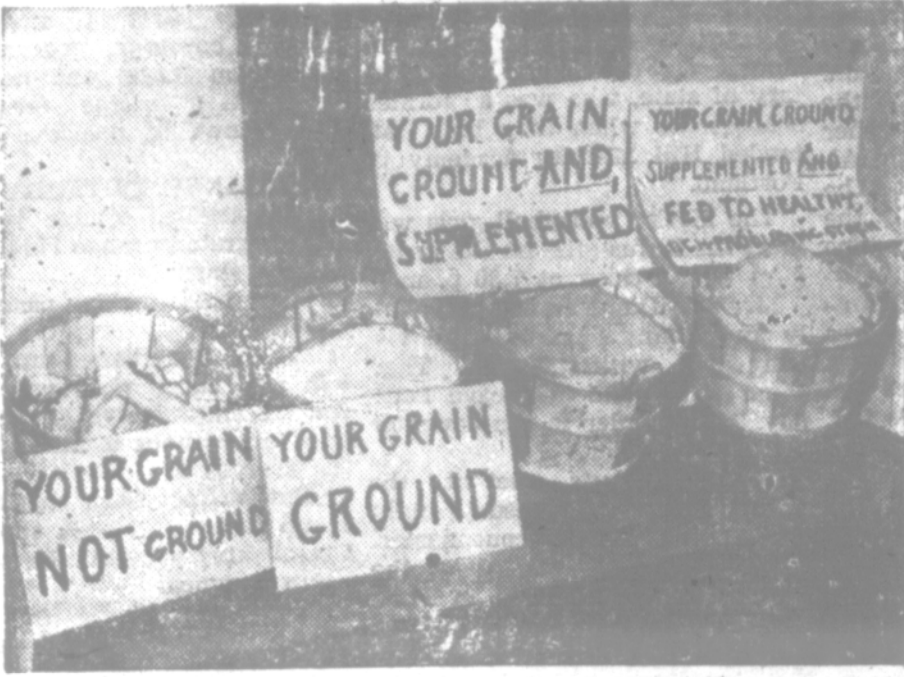
