Mrs Grant Boise, student at Monmouth, spent the vacation time with her folks, Mr and Mrs Curt Tom.

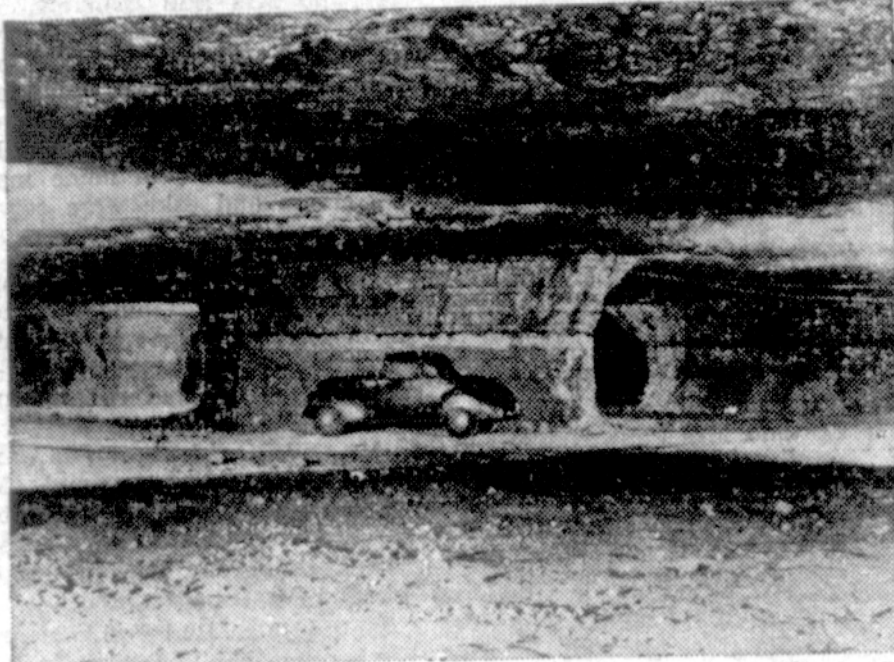
Elton and Phyllis Medler who are both sophomores at Oregon State spent the holiday season at the home of their mother, Mrs Grace Medler.

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

When there are many school children in the family, Mother must turn her attention to luncheon menus that will fit into a time limit. We would like to review a few lunchtime pointers which will make it easier and more enjoyable to prepare and serve the family lunch.

When Junior and Susie come running in from school, have the table set attractively and the meal ready to serve. Relax with your family - and no jumping up and down at the table! Serve a few things but plenty of them.

Follow the four point lunch plan when making up luncheon menus.

1. Substantial main dish (meat, fish, eggs, cheese)
 2. Vegetable and fruit (two servings)
 3. Bread and butter.
 4. Milk
- Include combinations of foods that appeal in taste texture and color - served with eye appeal. Remember to adjust servings to children's appetites and needs. Plan lunch when you plan other meals - when getting dinner make extra soup, main dish or dessert for tomorrow's lunch. Keep the refrigerator stocked with fresh vegetables - clean, crisp, ready to use. Keep quick luncheon foods on hand: cheese, eggs, fruit cottage cheese, ice cream and milk. Remember that a good cream or cheese sauce will form the backbone of any casserole dish. Combine left-over cooked vegetables with diced meat, chicken or fish, rice, spaghetti or noodles with cream sauce, top with buttered crumbs and bake.

Here are three ready in a jiffy luncheon menus that will satisfy everyone:

- No. 1
Cream of Cheese Soup
Buttered toast
Cabbage, Raisin and Apple salad
Chocolate Brownies (on hand)
Milk
- No. 2
Creamed Tuna fish on toast
Vegetable salad bowl
Ice cream and cookies

Milk
No. 3
Scrambled eggs
Tomato wedges or green salad
Buttered toast
Cooked fruit
Cocoa
Cream of Cheese Soup - To

each cup of thin cream sauce add 1/4 cup minced, cooked carrot, 1/4 cup minced, cooked celery, 1/2 cup freshly grated American cheese, and 1 tbs of onion sauteed in one tablespoon of butter. Heat and serve garnished with parsley.
