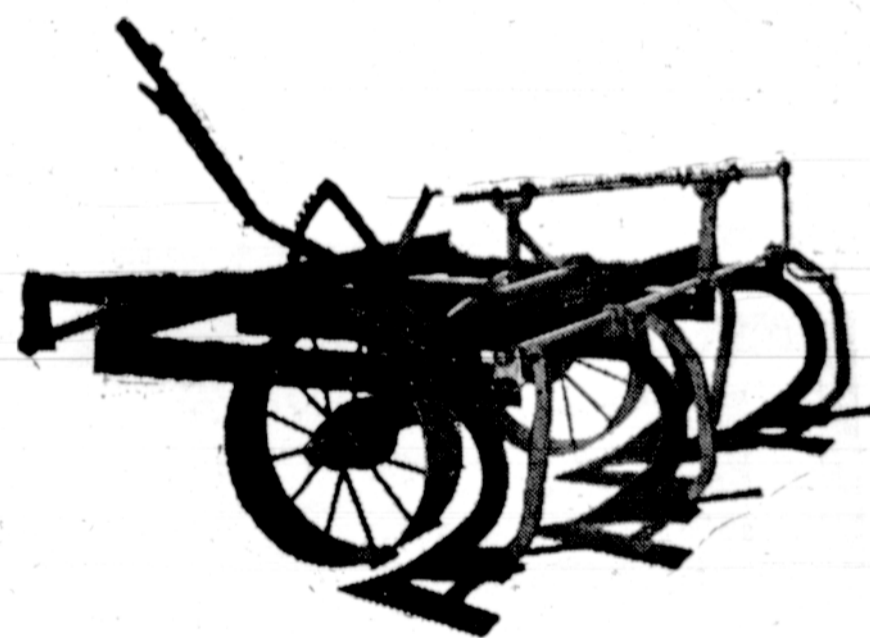

What Soil Structure Will Grow Best Crops?



From 32 inch single sweep size
to 13 foot five sweep size

Large size tractors pull several units of
these 8 foot and 11 foot plows.

FOR MAKING stubble mulch, to save moisture and to prevent soil drifting on dry land, operate at three inches to six inches in depth.

FOR PREVENTION of water erosion and for control of bad weed pests, operate at approximately nine inches. SOILVATOR can be adjusted to plow twelve inches or more in depth.

FOR CHISELING, remove sweeps and install chisel points on each curved plow beam.

Black Fallow:
