### WHEAT OUTLOOK BETTER

The outlook for wheat exports in 1948-49 and beyond was improved by the enactment of the European recovery program, says L. R. Breithaupt, Oregon State college extension agricultural economist. On the other hand, current crop reports are generally more favorable in grain-growing areas around the world than a year ago.

Principal grain importing nations are also getting shorter of means to pay for imports than they have been. Altogether, the United States exported nearly nine billion dollars more of goods and services than it imported in 1947, although imports exceeded exports. The deficit was balanced with loans and grants and the sale in this country of foreign owned gold, securities and other assets.

The ERP will help keep international trade going while some nations get back into production for export. That does not mean that total world trade or world trade in wheat will increase, Breithaupt believes. Eventually, exports must be balanced by imports, according to international trade experts.

International trade in 1947 was fully equal to the prewar year
