Lamar Tooze has announced the following platform:
"I believe in adequate Federal appropriations for the upbuilding of Oregon and the West by power development, reclamation, irrigation and conservation of natural resources. The Federal Government should reimburse the state for its tax loss caused by the Federal ownership of public lands. I firmly believe in private enterprise with proper safeguards, however, against monopoly and exploitation; also, full legal protection of labor's hard-won right to bargain collectively. I am against present bureaucratic control and for a return to constitutional government, an essential guarantee of human freedoms."
Mr Tooze, a member of the law firm of Calk, Jauregui & Tooze, is a native of Woodburn. An overseas veteran of both World Wars, he is a graduate of University of Oregon and Harvard Law School. He is chairman of the State Board of Bar Examiners and one of the commissioners of Portland Housing Authority. He commands the 104th Infantry (Timberwolf) Division, a reserve army unit.
