Moisture Comes Fast This Year

Rainfall for the crop year stood at 5.35 inches above normal at the experiment station and the 1947-48 year may be the wettest in recent times if June rains materialize and the skies indicate at this moment.

The east wind of the fore part of the week changed to cloudy skies and a west wind Wednesday night and a few sprinkles of rain have fallen.

Total rainfall from September 1 to May 31 was 15.57 inches whereas the normal is 10.22.

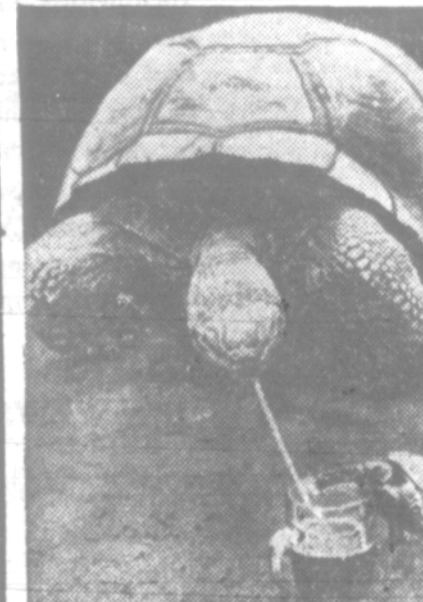
