 With the general bowing himself out as politely as he can, there seems little doubt but that Truman will be Dewey's opponent in November. He should be. The voters should have the privilege of voting for the present if they want to. Should the Democrats repudiate their actions of the past term or two or four the voters have nothing but change to support.  
 A party has little to offer the public if it discards its leaders in July and hopes to build a program by November.  
 Besides this Truman isn't a bad sort, perhaps not of presidential calibre, somewhat tainted by machine connections, inclined to speak hurriedly without much consideration of the subject, but a decent citizen without and one concerned with the country and its future. He has not flinched when the going has been tough. He is undoubtedly the best president since Herbert Hoover and he deserves better treatment than he is getting.

 It must be realized that one of the reasons for the growth of the Yes, Uh-Huh is a sort of fear of saying YES or NO. In some of the tender minded quarters they are considered brash or even brutal. A quick YES sounds more positive than some can stand and a positive NO is beyond the conception of any but the Russians.  
 Of course one must expect deterioration of the language as the people themselves become less assertive and less able to stand the bold opinions of their fellows. Back when, if one man said to another "Will you be here right after sun-up?" and the answer was, "YES", there was a meeting right after sun-up. The guy meant it. Were the same thing to occur nowadays and the answer was, "Yea, Uh-Huh", they might never meet again.  
 What we mean is that the double positive reduces the assurance that a positive answer should give. Should a young lady inquire of her swain if he loved her and he answered "Yes Uh-Huh" she might feel somewhat slighted—and justly.  
 But it will probably continue until some more vigorous and less fearful generation of men bring back a positive expression that resonates with assurance like, "You bet," "Sure Mike" or "Hell Yes."
