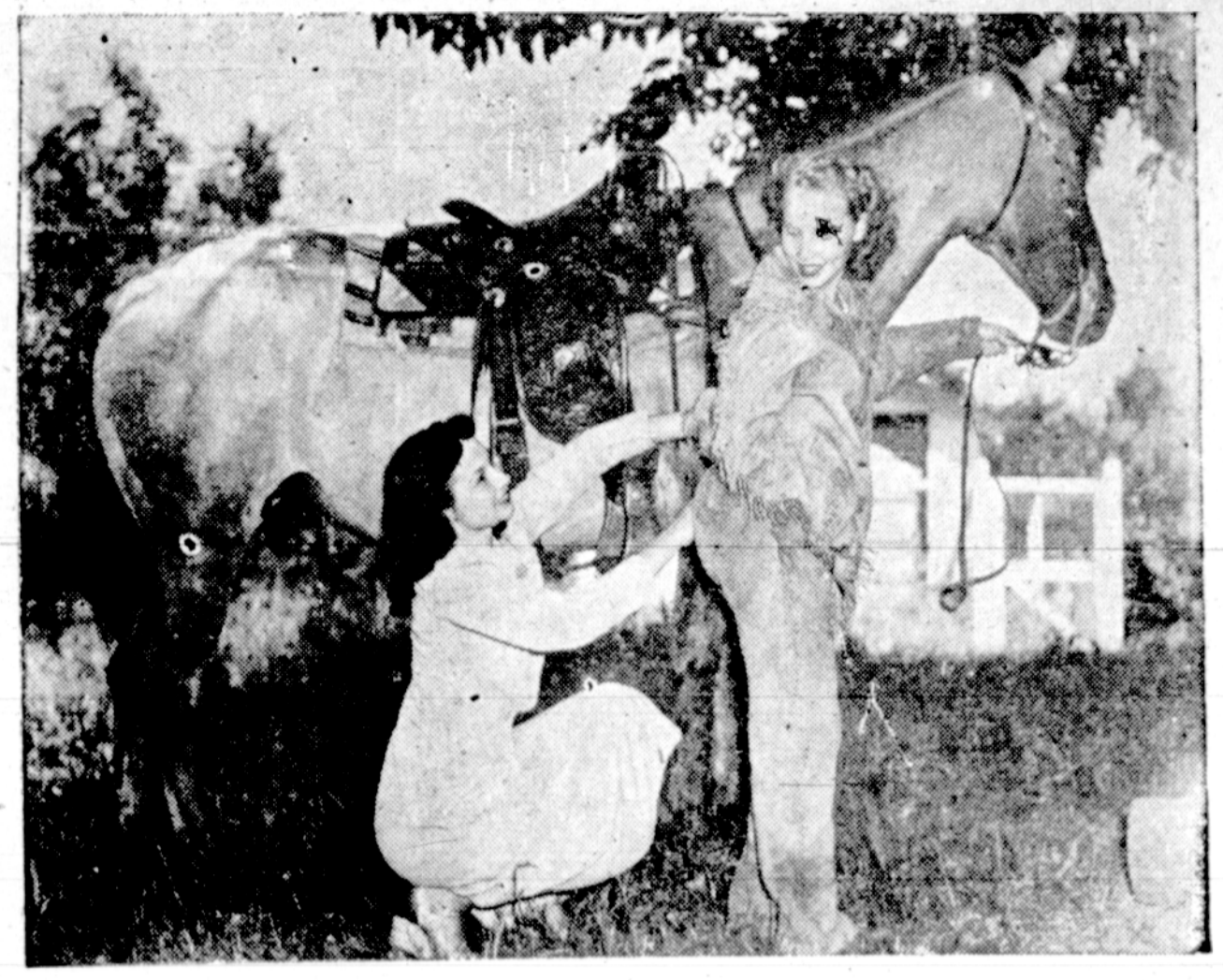
Mr and Mrs A. B. Christenson and son Ronnie are visiting with Mr and Mrs Harland McDonald this week. Their home is in Portland.
