**EMPLOYMENT HIGH**

Mid-year unemployment in Oregon dropped to 30,500, lowest since records became available, according to reports from 28 local offices based on work applications, claims and employer interviews. Despite widespread displacements as the result of June floods, the number of persons looking for work declined 700 in the metropolitan area during the month and 3,600 upstate. With employment reports indicating a steadily expanding labor force that is expected to exceed by 10,000 to 15,000 last year's late summer peak of 647,700, the number of those working in trade, industries and farms probably will establish new state records.

When one of the worst earthquakes of modern times hit Fukui, Japan, virtually the entire city was demolished and many thousands killed. Those few buildings that were left standing were burned out by fires that raged through the area.

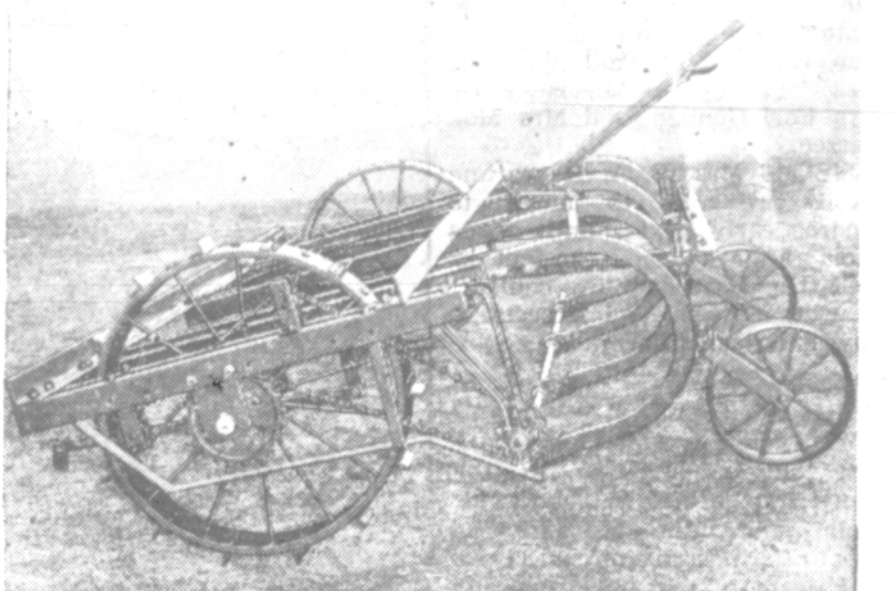
