HARVEST

In one way there isn't much to it anymore. The hours are still long but wet mornings prevent the use of as many hours as the old threshermen utilized. Machinery makes the job easier and much quicker.
 A farmer one time piled his grain in stacks with the aid of six or seven men, a header and some boxes on wagons. Then he waited and waited until some threshing outfit came his way. If wages and other costs were comparable the heading operation itself would have cost more than the entire harvest nowdays, but men worked 12 hours—or 14 for \$1.50 or \$2.00.

It was a great day when the thrasher came. The roustabout had to have fire wood and he often hauled the garden patch potatoes or such other vegetables as was growing. Although there was an attempt made to be careful a lot of hay was wasted in feeding the 20 or 25 horses used by the thrasher crews. There wasn't much the farmer could do about that, either.

When it was done there were great piles of straw and of sacked wheat that were hauled away, but many farmers left the straw stacks in the field for the stock to run to in winter.

A threshing crew requires about 20 men and on a good day it could thresh and sack 1000 sacks or a little over 2000 bushel, a job that many a four man crew can encompass in these modern times.

Heading used to take from two to three weeks for the average farmer and threshing went on into the fall, sometimes October. Harvest wages then were for a couple of months, now a couple of weeks of harvest is all that can be expected, but the total is more in dollars.

It is still the same kind of a season only because the crop harvested is the same, the social, economic and business characteristics are different.

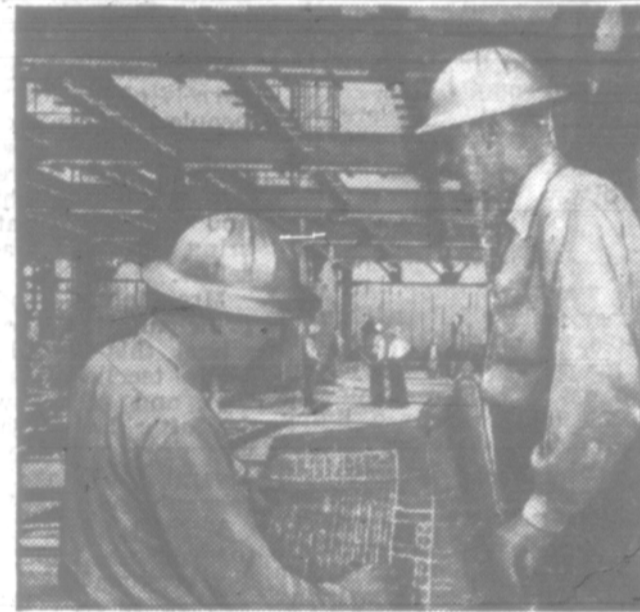

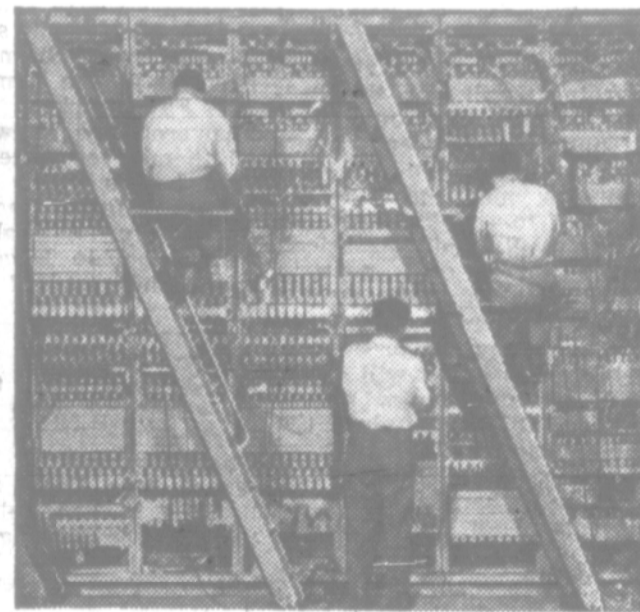
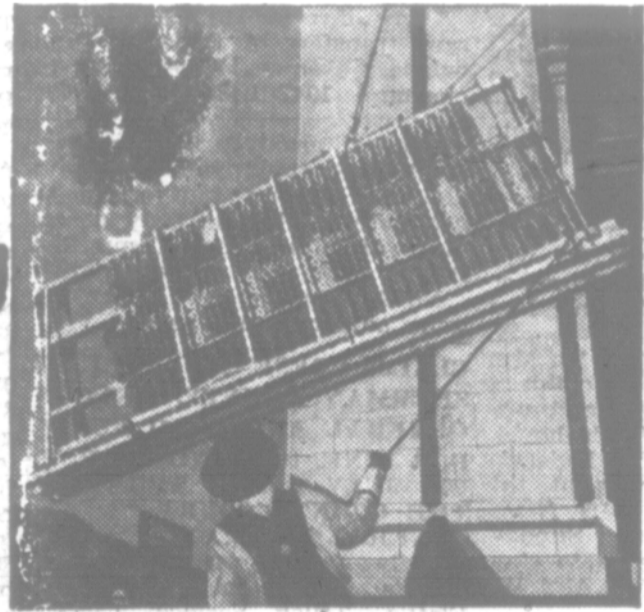
